A MAMMOTH trek from Gawler to Adelaide Oval has helped *The Bunyip* editor Ben Lennon smash his fundraising goal ahead of this weekend's third annual Hope Cup.

Ben undertook the 42km journey on Wednesday, November 6, in his efforts to help raise money for people sleeping rough as part of the Hope Cup.

While the going did indeed get tough for Ben, he powered through and finished the journey in a little less than 11 hours.

Following his walk, Ben said the blisters and general soreness were worth the effort, especially in the face of far exceeding his \$1500 fundraising goal.

"I saw a couple of friendly faces along the way, which was pretty cool and helped spur me on, although if you ask our photographer Mark what kind of mood I was in when he said g'day at the 35km stage he'd probably have to bleep out a few words," Ben said.

"Realistically though the most amazing thing out of all of it has been the support from my family, my friends and even people I've never actually met.

"From a fundraising perspective the goal has been smashed given we've almost raised \$2500, but even the social media comments and messages and general support, it's been unreal."

The day itself treated him well, but good weather was little consolation for Ben when he started to feel the impacts of his long walk.

"I'd imagine for someone that trains for this kind of thing it would still be pretty hard, but going into it with no training or real preparation at all meant that I was up against it," he said

"The first half wasn't too bad. I had to negotiate some tricky stretches with no real footpath available but I was feeling alright.

"The last 10km was very much a case of walk 800m or so and then find somewhere to sit for a couple of minutes.

"I sat at a bus stop for a rest towards the end of Main North Road and a bus actually rocked up while I was there. It took a lot of willpower not to hop on."

His partner, Hanna, came

to the rescue at some stage though, providing cold drinks and painkillers to help see Ben through the rest of the journey.

Now that it is behind him, Ben said his attentions had turned to the Hope Cup itself.

"I'm looking forward to

hopefully being able to walk properly again in time to help the All-Stars over the line in the Hope Cup this Sunday," he

"That would be a nice bookend to the whole journey."



Heavy hitters weigh in on grant application

A NORTHERN MP has taken aim at a council in his electorate following a grant submission that left him "gobsmacked" and a number of social media posts from councillors, including the deputy mayor.

Federal Member for Spence Matt Burnell has slammed City of Playford for leaving Curtis Road out of its submission for the recent Housing Support Program grant, which could see up to \$45 million of federal funding secured for local projects.

Mr Burnell revealed funding to fix Curtis Road was not part of the application and council instead asked for funds to help build the proposed Elizabeth sports entertainment complex, which includes the much-publicised ice arena.

"I couldn't fathom it," he said.

"I was shocked to receive an email from the City of Playford seeking funds for that ice arena, and a prewritten support letter saying 'sign here'.

"I immediately wrote back advising of my concern, that I will not sign and support their endeavour for an ice arena with a grant designed to help deliver housing when this money could be spent where it's needed most: on Curtis Road."

Mr Burnell also levelled criticism at a number of councillors who have taken to social media stating the proposed ice arena is not a council project.

"The City of Playford can portray the illusion that they spend ratepayers' money wisely and have their priorities in order," he said.

"I have consistently heard from elected members that the ice arena is a 100 per cent private venture – this has proven not to be the case, and it is the wrong priority for the City of Playford to pursue."

City of Playford Mayor Glenn Docherty defended council's actions and disputed Mr Burnell's accusations regarding the ownership of the ice arena.

He acknowledged the sports complex was one of three projects council attempted to secure funds for, but said it met the criteria of the grant and is not a council-funded venture.

"The submitted projects were carefully assessed to align with community and council priorities, and all met the grant criteria, which stated that the full scope of work must be completed by June 30, 2026, works

on ground are required to commence by January 31, 2025 and grants will be capped at \$45 million," he said.

"The criteria for the grant also enabledjoint applications from councils and private developers to apply where project outcomes enable infrastructure or community facilities to service or enhance liveability.

"As such, council supported an application to secure federal funding, to be matched by the private developer, to deliver the sports entertainment venue. This application does not require any council funding.

"Securing private and public investment to support growth in Playford has been a priority for council over recent years, and we have been open with our community about this."

Council was surprised

when the applications, which were for a "critical" road upgrade in Virginia, recreation facilities in the Munno Para area and supporting the private development of the sports entertainment venue, were denied by Mr Burnell.

"We sought support for the three applications from Mr Burnell. This is common practice when applying for grants," Mr Docherty said.

"On this occasion, Mr Burnell chose not to endorse any of the projects put forward by council.

"It's unusual for a member not to support applications that meet grant guidelines, so this was unexpected, particularly as our grant applications present real opportunities to deliver projects for our community."

Curtis Road has been an ongoing pain point for the Playford community for

years-on-end due to traffic congestion and a plethora of accidents.

Both Mr Burnell and Mr Docherty have expressed their desires to fix the road, which belongs to City of Playford, but the latter said it was not currently possible.

"Curtis Road did not meet the timeline eligibility criteria for this federal grant program," Mr Docherty said.

"Council chief executive Sam Green informed Mr. Burnell that Curtis Road did not meet the grant criteria, which made it ineligible for application.

"It's surprising Mr Burnell isn't aware of the criteria, as council had clearly communicated this to him.

"Council selected three projects that aligned with the grant's guidelines and provided the best chance for funding. The projects were not supported by Mr Burnell and instead, he suggested council should be lodging an application for a project that didn't even meet the guidelines."

Mr Docherty said applying for Curtis Road funding in this grant opportunity would fly in the face of the grant requirements themselves due to an ongoing State Government investigation.

"The council is of the

view that the most successful outcome for Curtis Road will be achieved through the collaboration of all three tiers of government and we are working towards this.

"This will be informed by the traffic study being delivered by the State Government, which is a critical input to the planning of the road solution.

In the aftermath of the grant applications, Mr Burnell has urged council to consider the intentions behind the funding opportunity when applying.

"While the scope for the grant was broad, its main goal was investing in infrastructure to support housing developments, which is why the initiative is called the Housing Support Program," he said.

"If Mayor Docherty believes local residents prefer an ice arena over upgrades to our congested local road network, he should come out and ask them, because I'm hearing completely different.

"We are in the middle of a housing crisis, and we need council to align their priorities with the community.

"We are shouldering a lot of the growth in our region, we need our road infrastructure invested in to ensure it can cope with the future growth".



Courts nearly ready for summer of netball

WORKS to redevelop the Gawler netball courts are nearing completion after around eight months of work.

In March this year, works began on redevelopments to bring the Gawler netball courts up to competition standard as part of Town of Gawler's \$4.8 million Essex Park and Gawler Showgrounds Master Plan.

Town of Gawler Mayor Karen Redman said the works are tracking very well, with the new courts looking "fantastic" so far.

"The acrylic is now complete, and we've wrapped up the lighting, asphalt, and car park too," Ms Redman said.

"Just a few finishing touches remain,

with landscaping and line marking next on the list.

"The project is right on schedule to complete everything by December 2024, so the Gawler and Districts Netball Association's summer season can kick off in January 2025 with brand-new courts."

Ms Redman called on volunteers to help add "some finishing touches" to the courts through a community planting event.

She encouraged people to get involved in helping develop the landscaping around the

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Rail 'under active consideration' in the Barossa

A POSSIBLE rail extension to parts of the Barossa Valley including Lyndoch is "under active consideration", according to South Australian Premier Peter Malinauskas.

On Monday, November 11, Mr Malinauskas toured the Barossa Park redevelopment site at Lyndoch as part of the fixture announcement for the 2025 AFL Gather Round.

During questioning, Mr Malinauskas was asked whether the redevelopment and the road safety focus on getting to and from AFL games would include extending the train line to Lyndoch through the Greater Adelaide Regional Plan (GARP).

While Mr Malinauskas did not confirm there were any plans in place to bring rail services to Lyndoch, he did say rail transport in the wider region was certainly on the radar.

"The GARP exercise is one of the most instructive

public policy endeavours that the State Government has embarked upon," he said.

"We're looking at how we set the state up for growth over a 30-year timeline and transport is central to that.

"We know that there is going to be growth in the north of Adelaide and we've got to do that in a balanced way that doesn't infringe upon the beauty of the Barossa, which of course is subject to a legislative boundary for growth anyway.

"Areas like Concordia, which does fall within [The Barossa Council's] remit, we've got to make sure transport planning is in place, including issues around the rail corridor.

"It's fair to say that is under active consideration as part of the GARP process."

The Barossa Council Mayor Bim Lange said he was pleased that growth amenities including transport and road networks, alongside tourism and accommodation, were constantly in conversation between council and State Government staff.

"It's about social infrastructure, transport, water, facilities, utilities; all of those things are critical to, with the build of Concordia, ensure that people can have a lifestyle that they're expecting to enjoy in the Barossa," Mr Lange said.

"We've been very proactive in this space and I really acknowledge how the Premier has come on board, released the land at Concordia and the amount of planning that's going into the infrastructure required there, but also the further transport needs throughout the whole region.

"I'm very pleased and proud that, collectively with the council and staff and the state government, all of those things are in conversation all the time."

The final copy of the GARP is expected to be handed down in the first half of 2025.

Draft stormwater plan out for consultation

"To better understand the community's priorities around stormwater management, we are sharing the draft plans and seeking your

feedback," she said.

"This plan takes an integrated approach to managing large scale flooding and minimising the adverse impacts on both urban and rural areas.

"This Friday, November 15, council is hosting a drop-in session from 10am to 12pm at the Evanston Gardens Community Centre.

"You are welcome to pop by and chat to our stormwater expert Shaun Fielding.

"The survey closes on Monday, November 25, 2024."

LYNDOCH'S redeveloped Barossa Park will host two matches during the 2025 AFL Gather Round fixture.

Early on Monday, November 11, South Australian Premier Peter Malinauskas and AFL chief executive Andrew Dillon visited Lyndoch to make the announcement.

Among the nine AFL premiership games hosted in South Australia on the weekend, two will come to the Barossa Valley to showcase the region on a national stage.

The region will see North Melbourne take on the Gold Coast Suns from 12.05pm on Saturday, April 12, followed the next day by a clash between Richmond and Fremantle, also starting at 12.05pm.

In announcing the Gather Round fixture, Mr Dillon referred to Lyndoch's sporting precinct's redevelopment as "the jewel in the crown".

"I can't believe how much progress has been made since I was

here last time," he said.

"Barossa Park here will host two games, showcasing the best of Australian Rules Football, but also Adelaide's food and wine offerings across the weekend.

"I can't wait to see how this precinct will be transformed."

Mr Malinauskas similarly highlighted the importance of Lyndoch and the wider Barossa Valley to the annual AFL fixture.

"We're certainly very excited about the fixture that has been released because I think there are some blockbusters that are worthy of the nation's attention," he said.

"Not just the games themselves, but also now seeing some brand new iconic venues like this one here in the Barossa Valley.

"You'll see from the views behind us, when this game of AFL is played in the Barossa Valley the rest of the country will know where it's being played: in one of the most beautiful wine regions anywhere in the world." With the two match-ups locked in, Mr Dillon said future AFL fixtures at Lyndoch were unlikely to include the two South Australian teams in the Adelaide Crows and Port Adelaide Power.

"The two match ups that we've got here will be sell-outs within minutes," Mr Dillon said.

"You just couldn't do it with Adelaide and Port Adelaide in terms of the number of fans they've got.

"There might be opportunities for them to play here pre-season."

The Barossa Council Mayor Bim Lange spoke exclusively to *The Bunyip* following the announcement and said there are already opportunities beyond Gather Round on the cards for the venue.

"We're already having conversations with the SANFL, with SACA, we're also looking at opportunities for this whole facility to be a function area as well," Mr Lange said.

"Yes, the Gather Round is important to our region and it was

AS the 3G mobile telephone network is shut down I'm concerned that mobile blackspots across Barker will increase in size and scope.


Being unable to make an emergency call is a dangerous plight for anyone, but particularly for people living in regional communities where distance between neighbours is often

Critical warning on mental health issue

I WRITE on behalf of the not-for-profit Mental Illness Fellowship Australia to highlight to readers that if you or someone you know is facing a mental health issue, reach out. Help is out there.

It is absolutely critical that there is much more action from all governments to support people in your area who have severe mental health issues.

It is now estimated an alarming 68 per cent of people who have severe mental health issues are missing out on any kind of community support to help them... that's nearly seven out of 10.

We are completely focused on getting rid of the stigma around severe mental illness in particular. It is time we all realised people who are affected need our support.

On average, people with severe mental illness die 23 years earlier than the general population. Statistics show 50 per cent of people with severe mental illness attempt suicide, compared to 3.7 per cent of the general pop-

A huge number of people who have a severe or complex mental illness are getting no community support whatsoever for their condition. It is critical to end the massive neglect of people who have mental illness in Austra-

Thousands and thousands of Australians with mental health issues are ending up in our local hospitals and emergency departments because they believe it is the only option for

We are highlighting as part of this new awareness campaign that the current system unfortunately actively channels people into emergency and hospital services, placing massive extra pressure on the system. So much trauma is involved with this process.

We urge people in your area to realise recovery is unquestionably possible. We have a key not-for-profit network called Finding North which has become a growing community on the internet, to link people with mental health issues with others in a similar situation so they can share their experiences.

Playford service helping veterans find their footing

A PLAYFORD veteran service is welcoming the community with open arms as part of a workshop designed to transition people out of the military and into civilian life.

Open Arms, a national veterans and family counselling service, has introduced a new and improved version of its Stepping Out workshop, with the first refreshed workshop coming to South Australia.

Stepping Out is designed to combat challenges that may arise when transitioning from fulltime military service.

Open Arms peer team leader Dion Cowdray said many do not realise the challenges associated with finding a life outside the military unless they have experienced it firsthand.

"A lot of the time in the military, you can be moulded to be someone you have to be to survive," he said.

"There's a lot that goes into transitioning out of the military, many people are left with a kind of mindset or a way of thinking, and transitioning out of that can be really hard.

"Our job is to try and look at the impacts of that and find a way to transition forward. We also look to break some of those myths and misconceptions around hard-line thinking and unpack how to move to a life after serving.'

The program helps members of the community to live their lives to the fullest outside of the military, including finding new career pathways, adapting to new communities, and creating networks.

Open Arms group program co-ordinator Gio Corso said the workshop was created to help those looking to transition

out of defence and for those who have already left, who might find themselves feeling

"The program is designed for people who are trying to adjust from the military lifestyle to the community, it focuses on social and personal adjustment and goes through several different aspects that come with that," he

"We have introduced several strategies and techniques to handle that transition, and we also open it up to the family to get involved too, because the work continues at home.

"The program will help people to create a transition plan, which captures their experiences and what they wish to take from the military, into their life outside of serving."

Although the program has been running for several years, the team has recently worked hard to give it a bit of a facelift and is excited to introduce the new version to the

"We have redeveloped the program to bring it up to date and to introduce a number of new techniques and initiatives for the community," Mr Cowdray

"Everyone has come together and brought their ideas and their learnings, our team oversees them and have created an upgraded programme that is going to be so helpful for our community."

The program is also designed to challenge some of those hard to talk about subjects, including mental health and the psychology behind leaving service.

"We can go pretty deep with this program. We talk about thoughts, feelings, ideas, and desires moving forward, and how serving might have impacted them as well," Mr Corso

"It's important that people these impacts recognise and can feel comfortable to reach out for a helping hand sometimes.

"If somebody needs some extra help, we have the services for that too, and we make sure they're connected to get that help."

Mr Cowdray said the program focuses on people's strengths, and how they can use them moving forward.

"The group brings together people with lived experience from all over the country, and we involve counsellors and practitioners who can support these people," he said.

"It's important to us that we make this program something serves participants after they leave as well, so they create a plan for moving forward and have set out goals to go towards."

Piccolo tables community GARP feedback

FEEDBACK on the draft Greater Adelaide Regional Plan (GARP) is on the way to the SA Planning Commission following community forums outlining residents' concerns.

Member for Light Tony Piccolo recently hosted community forums to gauge how residents are responding to the draft GARP.

The GARP aims to provide a planning blueprint for growth areas north of Adelaide, including Gawler, the Barossa Valley and the Adelaide Plains, with mixed responses coming to light.

The region's councils have all provided feedback on the draft, with community members now lending their voices.

Residents across Hillier, Kudla, Evanston Gardens and Evanston South were critical of the draft GARP and listed a range of possible amendments to better suit the needs of the community.

Mr Piccolo submitted the community feedback on behalf of his constituents and said concerns looked at preserving the region's unique identity, the provision of adequate lands connected to major transport routes, and opposition to the compulsory acquisition of land.

"The area has long suffered from policy paralysis, leading to uncertainty and reduced investment," Mr Piccolo said.

"Residents welcome the Planning Commission's efforts to outline a vision, but object to being told how to achieve growth.

"While we appreciate the draft GARP's intentions, the community should have a say in how development proceeds and the commission should work alongside the local community and council to develop a plan everyone can be proud of.

"We need policies that reflect our unique identity and meet our specific needs."

Mr Piccolo said the community's feedback aims to strike a balance between accommodating growth and preserving the unique character of Gawler.

"This collaborative approach will foster investment and ensure that future development respects both the history and future aspirations of our community," he said.

"We have a responsibility to ensure that the southern rural areas thrive within the greater Gawler region."

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Elizabeth pair fined for animal ill-treatment

A NORTHERN suburbs pair was convicted last week on charges of animal ill-treatment.

A 61-year-old man pleaded guilty to one count of animal illtreatment under South Australia's Animal Welfare Act, while his daughter, 39, was charged with two counts.

The charges were in relation to two ponies, one horse and two dogs found in an emaciated condition.

The defendants were also charged with failure to seek veterinary care for one of the ponies, a 21-year-old Welsh Mountain Pony named Princess, and to mitigate harm to the two mixed breed dogs - six-year-old Bella and eight-year-old Dominic.

RSPCA SA inspectors in

company with SA Police first attended the defendants' property at Kudla on June 8 2023, responding to a cruelty report.

The animals were seized by inspectors, with some also transported to nearby veterinary hospital and animal specialists.

In the Elizabeth Magistrates Court, Magistrate Joanna Martin sentenced the male defendant to a two-year good behaviour bond, victims of crime levy and prosecution costs.

The female defendant was sentenced to a three-year good behaviour bond, victims of crime levy and prosecution costs.

Magistrate Martin told the pair that "their offending was deplorable" and that they are "very lucky not to be looking at a sentence of imprisonment".

"The animals were at your home, you could see them day in and day out, yet you did not provide them the care that they so sorely needed," she said.

"If you cannot afford the costs of medical care, you cannot afford to care for horses.

"We have one chance and one chance only to care for animals and you failed.

"I am not willing to place animals at risk by letting them remain on the property when Princess was not taken to the vet when she would have clearly been in pain."

All five animals were surrendered to RSPCA SA and have made full recoveries.

Man dies following cycling incident

A GAWLER East man died in hospital following an incident on the road at Rowland

Around 11.30am on Sunday, November 10, emergency services responded to reports a cyclist had crashed on Steingarten Road, Rowland Flat.

The cyclist, a 65-year-old Gawler East man, was airlifted to Adelaide with life-threatening injuries, where he later died in hospital.

Major Crash investigators attended the scene to examine the circumstances surrounding the crash.

Police have not yet released details on whether or not another road user was involved in the incident.

The man's death was the 75th life lost on South Australian roads in 2024.

DV operation leads to arrests

AN ADELAIDE Plains man was arrested as part of a state-wide police operation targeting domestic violence offenders.

South Australia Police (SAPOL) conducted its second domestic violence operation for the year, Operation Storm, which saw 87 offenders arrested from nearly 400 interventions across

Among that number was a 39-year-old Adelaide Plains man, who allegedly assaulted his partner and set two cars on fire.

Polair and police dogs were called in to locate the man, who was subsequently arrested and charged with offences including assault, acts to endanger life, arson and road traffic offences.

The man was bailed with conditions in place to protect the victim.

Deputy Commissioner of Police Linda Williams said Operation Storm was a proactive approach to domestic abuse which aimed to deter ongoing offending.

"The two-week operation employed a deterrence approach towards perpetrators, with 135 support referrals made for offenders to access rehabilitation services," she said.

"As a result, 85 visited the SAPOL website to access this material, showing they are willing to access services to seek assistance with their behaviour.

"This operation shows our commitment to preventing domestic abuse. We will not only take actions against offenders who pose a threat to victims, but also proactively identifying opportunities to refer offenders to behaviour change programs."

DC Williams said police hopes continued operations like this one will help reduce rates Angle Vale arrest

of offending through early intervention.

A 35-year-old Two Wells woman appeared in the Elizabeth Magistrates Court on Friday, November 8, after she was allegedly caught trying to steal from an Angle Vale construction site.

Police alleged they were called to Parker Road just after 1am on Friday following reports a white van was parked near houses under construction.

Witnesses reported seeing two people walking around the sites.

Police dog Chaos attended the scene and located the Two Wells woman nearby.

A search found the woman was carrying tools, gloves and a mask.

Police charged her with being unlawfully on the premises, unlawful possession, and going equipped to commit an offence.

She was refused bail.

Police are continuing enquiries into the incident and encouraged anyone who witnessed suspicious activity in the area to contact Crime Stoppers.

MacDonald Park pair arrested

PROPERTY searches in Angle Vale and MacDonald Park led to the arrest of a 32-yearold man and a 33-year-old woman after police located drugs and a firearm.

On Wednesday, November 6, police searched two properties - one in Angle Vale and one in MacDonald Park - where they allegedly located large quantities of methamphetamine, ecstasy and cocaine.

Police also allegedly found a firearm. ammunition, body armour and cash.

The man and woman, both from MacDonald Park, were arrested and charged with a number of offences including drug trafficking, possessing a firearm without a licence and money laundering.

The pair did not apply for bail and faced the Elizabeth Magistrates Court on November 7.

They were both remanded in custody to reappear in court at a later date.

attendance, and how the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month holds a historically special meaning for those who saw a ceasefire that ended the war.


"Sadly, as history unfolded, many more conflicts followed, and many brave men and women have served to protect our freedoms and way of life," Ms Priestman said.

Red tape removed for winegrape growers across SA

GROWERS exporting winegrapes to Victoria and New South Wales will see one fewer regulatory burden through the discontinuation of the Greater Sunraysia Pest Free Area (GSPFA).

Under the GSPFA, established in 2006, accredited growers sending winegrapes to the eastern states needed to issue Plant Health Assurance Certificates.

However, the Victorian government has let the GSPFA lapse, which removes the area for regulatory purposes.

Department for Primary Industries and Regions South Australia (PIRSA) director of plant and invasive species biosecurity Nick Secomb said it was a positive for SA growers.

"These changes will significantly reduce red tape for businesses who previously required certification to send winegrapes into Victoria and New South Wales," he said.

Despite the change, Mr Secomb said the industry needs to remain vigilant to ensure there are no lapses in biosecurity.

"As QFF [Queensland fruit fly] is no longer regulated by the GSPFA, PIRSA and Vinehealth Australia are calling for greater vigilance by industry at all access points from Victoria and NSW into South Australia," he

"Additionally, any equipment used to transport grapes into Victoria or NSW that returns to South Australia must be clean and adhere to the SA Plant Quarantine Standard."

Shipments within SA subject to QFF restrictions must still adhere to all requirements for moving products within SA.

The Victorian Control Order in place for Lindsay Point is also still in place.

The winners of the SA awards have now gone in the running for the national equivalent against winners from around Australia.

Association of Independent Schools of South Australia chief executive Anne Dunstan said South Australian independent schools educate students from a diverse range of socio-economic, cultural and education need backgrounds.

"The member schools of the AISSA are greatly appreciative of this support provided by the minister through the State Government Capital Grant funding program which focuses on improving school capital infrastructure, particularly for the most educationally disadvantaged students and those schools that are working to meet the growing diverse needs of their students,"

Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer said all students have the right to reach their full potential, regardless of where they attend school.

"Schools across the education sector need to undertake strategic capital planning to address current issues and support future needs," he said.

"Some non-government

schools need to deal with enrolment pressures, manage accessibility concerns or update or replace spaces that are no longer suitable.

"The State Government has provided \$11 million, indexed annually, since 2018-19 for infrastructure upgrades at nongovernment schools. The funding is split equally between the independent non-government school and Catholic school sector."

Government seeks community views on transport future

THE State Government is seeking community feedback to help develop a 30-year transport strategy to address predicted population growth and increased traffic on our road network.

The transport strategy will aim to guide the state's transport network and the use of new technologies to boost liveability, connection to essential services and road safety.

The views of everyday South Australians will be sought to shape the strategy alongside industry experts, with pop-up sessions planned around the state through November and December.

The sessions will feature interactive 3D virtual reality (VR) experiences, which will ask participants to rank a series of transport priorities from least to most important.

Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Tom Koutsantonis said an efficient and well-planned transport system is "critical" to South Australia's future.

"We want as many South Australians as possible help to shape this strategy, so that future transport projects are in line with community, business and industry expectations," he said.

"That's why I encourage South Australians to participate in this process to shape what our road network, transport systems and communities will look like for generations to come.

"The VR experience is an innovative and fun way to explore what our cities or suburbs could look like in the future, while providing your valuable input.

"The cost of not planning transport infrastructure properly - and not bringing communities on that journey - is huge.

"Over the past decade, about \$30 billion worth of infrastructure projects across Australia have been cancelled, delayed or re-scoped due to poor planning."

Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) chief executive Jon Whelan said community engagement would play a significant role in shaping the transport strategy.

"Transport is such an important part of our daily lives," he said.

"It affects how we get to work, to school, and how goods and services are delivered.

"In developing the new transport strategy, it is essential that we know what's important to communities and industries across our state.

"We need people from all walks of life and from right across the state to get involved in this community consultation, to help shape a transport strategy that will have lasting benefits for our communities and our industries in the decades to come."

The pop-up sessions in our region are booked in for 12.30pm to 3.30pm on Wednesday, November 13 in Gawler and from 10am to 1pm on Monday, November 25 in the Barossa.

State Government provides road safety message to workplaces

A NEW workplace road safety guide has been released in an effort to reduce the number one contributor to serious injuries and deaths at work; vehicle use.

The new Workplace Road Safety Guide outlines steps employers and workers can take to support safer driving on the job, providing tools and resources to minimise risk and ensure road safety is a priority at work.

In South Australia, road incidents accounted for around half (36) of the 73 work-related deaths from 2019 to 2023 – and 11 of the 17 lives lost last year.

Safe Work Australia data also shows 75 of the 200 worker lives lost nationally in 2023 were on the road, making work-related driving one of the most significant workplace risks that organisations can manage.

Recommended policies include zero tolerance for failing to wear a seatbelt, making speeding a disciplinary issue, a no-alcohol policy during work hours, eliminating mobile phone use to avoid driver distraction and promoting good driver behaviour.

The guide emphasises the importance of workplaces choosing and maintaining safe vehicles, use of assistance technologies and carrying out regular safety checks, and developing a fatigue management plan.

Minister for Police and Emergency Services Dan Cregan said getting behind the wheel for your job is "one of the biggest risks you can face at work".

"Every worker deserves to come home safe and workplaces need to ensure clear responsibilities and reporting measures are in place," he said.

"The guide developed aims to get employers thinking about how they manage risk and improve road safety outcomes for their staff and wider community.

"We also want to encourage workers to play their part on the road and adopt safe driver behaviour."

This initiative forms a key part of South Australia's Road Safety Action Plan 2023- 2025, the State Government's commitment to deliver targets to reduce lives lost and serious injuries on SA roads

Ms Stewart said such donations help the team support the hundreds of families across the state who need it the most.


"We support 20 families at any given time and last year, over the course of the whole year, we supported about 420 families," she said.

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Research targets agricultural emissions

SOUTH Australia is spearheading research into lowering greenhouse gas emissions in the state's agricultural sector.

A partnership between State and Federal Governments and the agricultural industry is leading research into emissions reductions to help South Australia reach net zero emissions by 2050.

The State Government committed \$8.4 million in funding towards the research, with South Australian Research and Development Institute (SARDI) leading the way.

The research forms part of the State Government's commitment to cut greenhouse gas emissions by at least 60 per cent by 2030 and reach net zero by 2050.

In 2022, agriculture accounted for around 37 per cent of SA's emissions, with fertiliser production and use making up a significant portion.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said the pressure to reduce emissions will only increase in the coming years.

"We have already reached a 50 per cent reduction from 2005 levels," Ms Scriven said.

"But to reach net zero by 2050 we really need to act now across all sectors, and this commitment is the first step towards our agriculture sector – which employs so many South Australians across our regions – to reach this target."

"SARDI is already doing great work in this space, including undertaking research and development in greenhouse gas emissions reduction and sustainability, such as methane mitigation in livestock and agronomic practices to reduce inputs and improve carbon sequestration.

"It is important to note this funding isn't just to implement products into farms now, but it is also about the investment into the necessary research so the right solutions for our unique and beautiful environment can be developed into the future.

"I look forward to seeing the innovative research and development that will be achieved through this commitment to help us get to net zero and preserve our state for generations to come."

"We've got a function room upstairs that caters to around 50 people for sit down events and a few more standing up," Mr Harley said.


"We've done sporting presentations in [the dining area] and that can do 80 to 100 people, depending on configuration of course.

A better start

THE importance of early education for children is now widely recognised.

Playgroups are far more than places where pre-school children play. Their play has a learning purpose.

Spielgruppe, the playgroup run by the Barossa German Language Association, is a playgroup with a difference.

Combined with Kinder Klub (children's club), it is held at the Langmeil Centre, 7 Maria Street, Tanunda every Tuesday during school term from 4 to 5.30.

The time allows parents to bring their young primary school children and their pre-school children to the same place, where activities appropriate to their age are conducted by instructors who converse with the children in English and German.

The earlier a child learns a language the more likely that child is to retain that language. For that reason, Rose Flint has been bringing her daughter to the Langmeil Centre.

Ms Flint grew up speaking German, and she wants her daughter to have the same opportunity to learn a language other than English and so become aware of a culture beyond Australia's shores.

For children who are home schooled, Spielgruppe and Kinder Klub offer an extension to their learning as well as developing their social skills through interaction with other children.

Parents who home school their children may quite successfully teach such subjects as English, history and geography, mathematics and science, but few would feel comfortable in teaching a foreign language.

An exciting development this year has been affiliation with the Children's University.

The purpose of Children's University is to encourage children to learn, to seek knowledge, to understand there is knowledge to be gained beyond the classroom. Participants acquire a way of thinking, an enquiring mind, which will serve them well in attaining success in their secondary and tertiary studies.

Young children require encouragement, and for their involvement in activities they are awarded stamps which lead on to graduation ceremonies.

To indicate the importance of their achievement the ceremonies take place in major educational facilities such as universities.

But learning should be fun, and that is why Karin Simms has been bringing her children to Spielgruppe and Kinder Klub for nine years and Robert von Linde has been bringing his for seven. As Robert says, it is fun for parents too.

Business events bring record high contribution to economy

BUSINESS Events Adelaide has announced a record high financial year for 2023-24 worth \$336 million to the State economy.

The 50-year-old independent, not for profit, member-based organisation aims to win business events for South Australia, a valued and proven economic driver in both the long and short term.

During the annual general meeting, held at Immersive Light and Art (ILA) last week, Business Events Adelaide chair Ian Horne advised that 174 future business events had been secured.

Mr Horne also announced that the model used to

value business events had been reviewed by the South Australian Centre for Economic Studies from the University of Adelaide, with new figures indicating that interstate and overseas delegates spend \$1,165 a day whilst in Adelaide for a business event.

"Attracting 174 business events and more than 60,000 delegates to Adelaide – filling city hotels along the way – boosts the state economy and provides an enduring economic tail of meaningful connections and commercial opportunity," he said.

Minister for Tourism Zoe Bettison said the State Government recognises the value of business events committing \$14m over four years in the last budget to boost the Business Events Fund to increase visitation in winter months.

"Business events like conferences and conventions are the bread and butter of our visitor economy, filling our hotels throughout the week with business delegates spending significantly more per person than leisure visitors," she said.

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POV: Daniel's camera the man behind the mischief

SOMEHOW, Daniel James Down manages to wrangle every local legend in Gawler and share such beautiful stories of their life, hobbies, and aspirations, in a way that enables us as readers to appreciate them even more.

Although until now, no one has spoken about one of the most hardworking, determined and passionate humans of them all; Daniel Down himself.

I am lucky enough to spend time, explore and create art with Daniel, and I think it is about time you all get to hear about the man behind the mischief for yourselves.

'I was told Australia has no water, and is all outback and kangaroos'

Daniel James Down moved from Southampton, England, to Australia, with his parents, two sisters and brother in 1991.

Daniel's family went on a holiday to Spain, which ignited the desire to move to a different country with Daniel's mum telling the story that she always wanted to live in Australia and asked his dad every year to move here.

He always said no, until one day, he actually said yes, with immigration papers on the table the next day.

Daniel, however, did not want a bar of it, finding every excuse in the book not to move.

"I've got a girlfriend now", he would say at 11 years old, also claiming he "wouldn't be able to learn the language" or "the money is too different".

Their initial plan was to move to Perth but they ended up arriving in Salisbury, South Australia, in 1991.

Daniel's understanding of Australia was entirely based upon TV his mum would watch, such as Neighbours, Home and Away and A Country Practice, as well as videos his dad's uncle would show him on a projector of documentaries of the outback.

You can only imagine the shock on his face seeing Salisbury in Australia, in comparison to England. After attending Para Hills West Primary school, the best friend Daniel made there, moved to Gawler, so his mum and dad would drive him out here each weekend to see him.

Eventually they found a block of land in Willaston and moved in the mid-1990s, living in Gawler and surrounds ever since.

Even after moving to Gawler, Daniel attended Para Hills West High School, wanting to work in information technology (IT) because of his interest in computers and desktop publishing.

After leaving high school he did several courses in IT.

"Everyone was told to get into IT", he said, meaning there were not many jobs in that department going around.

After a while, Daniel realised that computing and IT was just like any other hobby that he has. He would throw himself into it really hard, then get bored of it.

"One year I picked photography for God knows what reason, and that has stuck with me ever since"

Seeing school as a place to hang out with friends and not a whole lot else, one year Daniel picked photography as a subject and has been passionate about it ever since.

He has always been into the artsy sort of things, finding himself drawn to desktop publishing, photography, drawing, design, drama and music.

Initially, Daniel picked up saxophone, following after the "coolest guy in school" and eventually moving onto guitar, before giving up both instruments.

Years later in his early 20s, he found himself reaching for the guitar again, aspiring to form a band with his friends, heavily inspired by Green Day and Blink-182, where they could rock out without a care in the world.

A few years later, after working as a computer tech at Nuriootpa High School, a local bakery, the Gawler Cinema and Coles Gawler, Daniel worked at Nuriootpa Foodland, eventually landing himself a part-time job at Sienna Foods, which developed into him now being a full-time merchandiser/sales representative for Sienna Foods, covering the Mid North and the Yorke Peninsula – anywhere from Peterborough to Brighton.

Through this time, Daniel met his lovely wife Kelly, who he speaks so highly of. It melts everyone's heart just listening to him speak about her and how much he wholeheartedly appreciates everyone he surrounds himself with. It is heartwarming and beautiful to see how much he treasures what he has

Anytime you see Daniel, rest assured the photographer in him is analysing his surroundings for angles, colours and lighting that contribute to an amazing photo.



He loves "showing people what he's looking at, and sharing the beauty of what's around them" which has driven him to not only run the *I'm from Gawler* and *Gawler in Photographs* Facebook pages, but also run walking photography tours, with Gawler Youth, to encourage the younger generation to appreciate their surroundings.

As driving is such a large component of Daniel's job, he gets to see an array of scenery, which always inspires him to take different photos of the landscape.

He finds himself constantly pulled over taking photos or pinpointing locations on his map to come back to.

His love towards landscapes and history is so clear in all his photos – it is truly inspiring to see what draws his eye and what terrain Daniel sees, that motivates him to dedicate himself to creating such astonishing art.

From my perspective, it has been amazing to see what catches Daniel's eye, and how he can capture the most beautiful parts of different spaces.

We have spent quite a bit of time recently exploring new spaces - specifically places through Gawler - which do not get talked about enough or that the public does not know much about.

As a part of History Month 2025, Daniel will be exhibiting some of his photographs in the space outside of the Gawler Civic Centre café, tentatively titled 'Gawler Underground'.

These works will feature some of the hidden basements beneath Gawler's very own streets and will be accompanied by a video from himself and local historian Allen Tiller.

The pair will be discussing spooky stories and history of the town, or even the very building they are stood in.

Local artists will then create and share their interpretation of said stories, or the general feel of the spaces.

The entire exhibition promises to be a phenomenal multimedia experience, which we do not seem to see very often.

He will definitely be confused pretending to know your name, then say "I'm so sorry, who are you?" (don't tell him I said that).

















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

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

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

2024/25 Representation Review

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Gawler's Saturday struggles continue

IT was another tough week for the Gawler Bowling Club, who went down in all seven grades across Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday.

Starting with the club's only Division 1 side – who earned promotion after winning this past season's Division 2 premiership – Gawler dropped its third on the trot, falling to 1-3 following the 90-56 home defeat against Grange.

Grange – a perennial Division 1 side – swept the three rinks on offer, although Gawler nearly snatched a couple premiership points in a narrow 26-25 frame as Lorraine Cram, Joan Hillsden, Dawn War-

land and Kay Moncrieff came agonisingly close.

The local ladies now sit 1-3 in the top grade, although there is some room for optimism after the one side Gawler defeated in Round 1, Lockleys, knocked off previously unbeaten ladder-leaders Holdfast Bay 59-54 for their first victory.

The other Thursday matchup was even more of a blowout as Gawler suffered an 86-29 home loss at the hands of Hope Valley, dropping the three rinks 31-13, 26-6 and 29-10.

Things were no better on Wednesday as the Gawler Div 2s became Semaphore's first scalp of the season, coming away on the wrong end of all five rinks in a 152-64 blowout.

The only crew to come within 10 shots of their frame was the fours team of Ian

Goodrich, Mick Nichols, Matthew Kenneth May and Patrick Shepherdson (22-13).

The Wednesday Div 2s will have a chance to bounce back in a big way this afternoon when hosting undefeated West Lakes (4-0) at 12.15pm.

Wednesday's Division 4s contested Gawler's closest matchup of the week as the quartet of Andrew Whiddon, Jack Marsh, Darryle Roach and Gordon Nussey banked a 21-11 win, but it came in a 55-47 team loss against Para Hills.

Despite the result, Gawler sit fourth in that 10-team division with a 2-2 record, boasting the third-best score differential at +44. Only four of the 10 teams own a differential greater than +1.

Moving to the Saturday action, Gawler's top-ranked outfit remained stuck to the bottom of the Division 3 ladder, slipping to 0-5

after an 84-61 loss away from home at Modbury.

The locals did manage to split the four rinks at two apiece, including a 20-12 win from Kym Reynolds, Barry Bradbrook Jr, Judy Boucher and Bernard Smith, and an 18-16 result from Darren Hunter's crew.

Gawler is also winless (0-4-1) in the Saturday Div 4s, as a 27-15 rink from Robert Monti, Bill Anderson, Jacqui Goodrich and Bob Fuller was not enough to overcome a 107-68 hammering from the visiting Hope Valley.

The Saturday struggles continued in Div 6 (0-5), with another Gawler loss, this time 74-38 at Modbury. The three Saturday teams now have a combined record of 0-14-1, meaning there is nowhere to go but up for the rest of the season.

in hard-fought round

THE Barossa and Light Bowling Association's Saturday Div 1s put together one of the closest rounds in league history this week, with three top-grade fixtures being decided by just four combined shots.

Eudunda has been the early standout, emerging from the midfield in previous seasons to reach this past Saturday's Round 6 as the only side yet to suffer two defeats.

That is still the case heading into Round 7, but the ladder-leaders had to settle for a 78-78 draw away from home against Mount Pleasant, whose only other win came against reigning wooden-spooners Tanunda in Round 1.

Eudunda ended up claiming three of the four rinks on offer, with the largest being a 25-17 result from the four of Bill Mader, Des Schiller, Kym Schutz and Aaron Jones – but all their hard work was undone by a 26-13 frame from Mount Pleasant's Chad Vivian, David Cook, Noelene Birt and Dave Kroehn to share the premiership points.

Sitting right behind Eudunda on the ladder is Lyndoch, who improved to 4-2 by narrowly knocking off reigning premiers Angaston 80-77.

It was hardly a massive upset after Ango's slow start and the fact that Lyndoch finished second last time around, and in a close battle with the rinks split 2-2 it was a 25-13 frame from Docker quartet Aaron Ayres, Chris Rule, Ashley Thomas and Harry Sykes that dragged the home team over the line.

For Angaston, the club still remains in the top-four at 3-3, but has already tripled the amount of defeats it suffered in the 2023/24 season (17-1-3).

Despite the team's strug-Angaston players Graeme Miller, Justin Morris, Jorn Jensen and Joshua Turai joined Lyndoch's Harry Sykes and Ashley Thomas as the only players in the division to boast perfect 6-0 records from the six rinks they have contested.

The third and final team to have already accumulated four wins is surprise-packet Tanunda, who took out finals regulars Nuriootpa 75-74.

It appeared like it was going to be another disappointing Tanunda bowls season after an 83-63 road loss at Mount Pleasant in Round 1, but the Magpies have since defeated Freeling, Angaston, Kapunda and now Nuriootpa in their past five outings to revive the campaign.

Nuri seemed to have the overall advantage against Tanunda, winning three of the four rinks (22-18, 19-15 and 18-14), but one great 28-15 performance from the crew of Tim Liersch, Ian Graetz, Susan Yates and Peter Temme was just enough to claw over the top.

Rounding out the Division 1 action was the most one-sided matchup of the weekend, which was still a competitive 83-73 away win for Kapunda at Freeling.

Keeping with the theme of the round there was one tied rink 21-21, and Kapunda claimed two of the other three.

The match-winning effort came from Kapunda's Adrian Green, Brett Rowland, Grant Wilton and Martyn Ransom by a score of 29-9, more than cancelling out the 25-13 buffer from the Freeling crew skippered by Trevor Heinjus.

Jessica and Travis welcomed their second child, a baby boy named Harrison, into the world on November 4.

Surely a quick trip to Perth to play in the final this past Sunday Trav needs leading into the first

After all, Travis has not played a game of cricket since the firstround Sheffield Shield match between South Australia and NSW in early October.

That means that Head will go into the first Test against India having not having played a match for 42 days – six whole weeks.

Call me old school, but I do not believe that is the ideal build-up to playing a Test match against the strongest cricket-playing nation on the Earth's surface.

And, in that game, Head scored a combined 40 runs, in two innings, from 62 balls faced.

It is a long-held belief that the best form of cricket practice, both with bat or ball, is out in the middle, in a real game of cricket.

I say let your bat do the talking, and there is no doubt that scoring a mountain of runs is the best way of building one's self-belief and confidence in making even more.

While he is yet to find that major race winner, Fewings has been able to celebrate breeding racetrack winners.

The latest was four-year-old mare Painted Pony, which scored a strong win in the Sportsbet Nobody Does It Easier Fillies and Mares Maiden (1500m) at Gawler on Thursday where the Gawler and Barossa Jockey Club staged a meeting to coincide with the Victoria Oaks meeting at Flemington during Melbourne Cup week.

The Oaks meeting highlights fashion and the trend has carried across to Gawler, with an excellent crowd getting into the spirit.

A successful journalist, radio talkback host and race-caller during his work life, Fewings is now busy in retirement breeding and training greyhounds with partner Jane McNicholl from properties at Williamstown and near the River Murray between Mannum and Murray Bridge.

His most recent thoroughbred breeding involvement was through

a mare Iberian Rubi, which has now gone to the Toole family in Kadina.

"I was lucky to breed and race a filly called Spanish Heirloom by the stallion Barbados, which the Tooles' stand at stud," Fewings said.

"So I have sent the mare up to them to be mated again with Bar-

"Spanish Heirloom won nine races, including one here at Gawler, and was good enough to compete in listed company, but I sold her to

"She was a big impressive filly while her half-sister, Painted Pony, by Gold Standard, was a lot smaller.

"Spanish Heirloom showed talent from day one, while Painted Pony looked destined for failure, but slowly has begun improving.

"One was an out-and-out sprinter, and the other looks better as she gets out over ground."

Fewings selected Morphettville trainer Travis Doudle to prepare his

At Gawler, Painted Pony was given a great ride by Ben Price who was able to settle the mare in the running line just behind the leaders.

Price angled the mare between runners to challenge turning for home and Painted Pony, a wellbacked \$2.45 favourite, raced away

to win by one-and-a-quarter lengths from Lady Skylla (\$5), with the pacemaker Shalhavmusik (\$4.80) a similar margin away third.

Doudle brought up a double when Southern Shooter scored a photo-finish victory in the final event, the Ray White Barossa Valley Two Wells Rating 0-56 Handicap (1200m).

Ridden by Callan Murray, Southern Shooter (\$5.50) pushed through on the rails to score by a head from Charlesfort (\$16), with Justica's Bonus (\$8.50) two-and-a-quarter lengths away third.

The 'king' of Gawler, trainer Gary Searle celebrated his 65th birthday on Wednesday, and his training partnership with wife Nichole and daughter Brianna Callanan looked likely to celebrate a win with Gruelling in the Paxton Street Storage Rating 0-56 Handicap (1500m).

Jockey Jason Holder sent Gruelling (\$2.60 favourite) to the lead early in the home straight and expectations were high, but Prancing Countess (\$6), trained by Chris Bieg, which had been trailing, sprinted strongly and raced past to win by a length.

FOR the third consecutive round to begin the Para District Cricket Association Grade 1 season Adelaide Hazara has posted a score in the 300s, this time setting North Pines a target of 9/378 to chase on day two.

Charlie Brant took 4/52 from seven overs and Archie Schiller claimed 2/16 from eight overs as the pick of the Jets bowlers, while Archie Matthews (38 from 30 balls) and Saish Valani (27 from 47) were the top performers with the bat in an innings that finished all out for 123 in the 28th over.

Being named as part of the Round 1 team was a great first step, but it was a tough start to the season for both Port Adelaide and Wendland in the club's third AFLW season.

Port Adelaide list manager Naomi Maidment said both Germech and Wendland had made the most of their second opportunities in the AFLW and deserved their contract

"Teagan and Caitlin came to our club relatively late in the pre-season but settled in seamlessly and have contributed strongly throughout the course of the season," she

"Caitlin's foot skills are among the best in our side. While we like her ability to impact the scoreboard, she also works really hard to keep the ball in our forward half.

"Caitlin has shown she has an excellent football IO and at still only 21, it's very exciting to see where her game can go.

"We're really pleased with what both Teagan and Caitlin have brought to our club and look forward to their continued development over the next three seasons."

Port Adelaide will have their sights set on an eighth consecutive victory this Saturday night when they head on the road to take on a Hawthorn side that finished second on the ladder, and lost to reigning premiers Brisbane by six points in their double-chance qualifying final.

INGREDIENTS


- Large clear jar
- Small bowl
- Water
- Vegetable oil
- Liquid Food coloring
- Tablespoon

METHOD

- 1. Prepare Your Workspace: Lay down a protective surface (like a tray) to catch any spills, as food coloring can stain.
- 2. Pour water into the large jar, filling it about 3/4 of the way full.
- 3. In a small bowl, combine 3-4 tablespoons of vegetable oil with 2-4 drops of each food coloring you choose. Experiment with different color combinations!
- 4. Gently stir the oil and food coloring with a spoon. The goal is to break up the color droplets a little, but not completely mix them.
- 5. Slowly pour the colored oil mixture into the jar of water.
- 6. As the oil hits the water, the food coloring will sink and spread, creating a beautiful "fireworks" effect!


