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Elizabeth study hub announcement is...

SUSH good news

STUDENTS across the north will have access to tertiary education closer to home following the announcement of a Suburban University Study Hub (SUSH) in the Playford area.

Elizabeth will soon become home to one of 10 SUSH sites, enabling better access to university education for people living in Adelaide's northern regions.

The news follows a call last year made by the Universities Accord to bring study hubs to region-

al areas of Australia with the aim to future-proof the career paths of students across the country.

As far as university outcomes go, Spence is said to be the second-most disadvantaged federal electorate in the country.

Dublin code amendment raises some concerns

A COMMUNITY forum will be held on Sunday, November 24 at the Dublin Cricket Club to discuss the proposed code amendment to create an employment zone just outside the township.

Member for Light Tony Piccolo organised the forum after residents living in the Dublin and Thompson Beach areas reached out to him for advice.

Mr Piccolo said the proposed Dublin Green Circular Economy Precinct was a worthwhile idea, but some residents in the area are finding it difficult to reconcile the concept with the publicised employment zone.

"The apparent lack of clarity about the proposal is raising some concerns," he said.

"Code amendments are very powerful processes that can lead to significant zoning changes, so we need to ensure that residents understand both the process and what is being proposed.

"Sadly, the greater Dublin area has been subjected to some very controversial waste management decisions in the past, so there is some scepticism about what has been proposed."

While the current process only considers the rezoning of some farmland to an employment zone, the residents would like to gain a better understanding of how the mining and the mooted residential areas fit in to create the new precinct.

Mr Piccolo said that both the proponents of the rezoning and the Adelaide lains

Council will be invited to attend the community forum, to ensure all parties are making decisions based on the same information.

"Residents and local councils play an important role in the code amendment process, so it is critical that they are making decisions based on the same facts," he said.

"While the Minister for Planning is the final decision maker, advice from the South Australian Planning Commission and the community engagement report play a key role in the process."

The forum will be held at 2pm on Sunday, November 24 at the Dublin Cricket Club, with all interested parties welcome to attend.

Playford chosen for new study hub

While almost one in two young people in their 20s and 30s nationally have a university degree, less than 10 per cent of all people in Spence have one.

Since the interim report calling for study hubs was released last year, Member for Spence Matt Burnell has strongly backed the idea and pledged his support for the City of Playford's application for a SUSH.

Now, the Federal Government has announced Elizabeth as a location for the hub, which will provide student support and campus-style facilities for students who are studying a university or TAFE course, without having to leave their community.

The move is part of a \$66.9 million investment to establish 20 hubs across

The hub is set to become a communitydriven space that offers tailored support to the Playford community, including study spaces, computer facilities and internet access.

Administrative and academic skill support services such as developing writing and research skills and managing administrative processes will also be introduced alongside general wellbeing support, study and career advice at the site.

Mr Burnell said he was recently joined by students across the north to push for more accessible and affordable study options.

"The next generation cannot be left behind," he said.

"With 90 per cent of new jobs requiring post-school qualifications, it is essential that barriers to study are brought down.

"Travel time is a huge obstacle. Over two hours can be lost in a day travelling from our community to campuses in and around the city, making it extremely difficult to

balance studying with work and personal commitments.

"This announcement will bring a slice of uni to the very doorstep of our community, meaning you won't need to commute into town or further to get your assignments done."

Mr Burnell said SUSH will also link with the existing TAFE campus in Elizabeth.

"[This will lead to] connecting tertiary opportunities together, and creating more accessible pathways to well-paying jobs," he said.

"Our community has been calling for greater access to uni for decades. I am so proud to be making this announcement in my first term, to effect real change in the north."

City of Playford Mayor Glenn Docherty said council thanked the Federal Government for bringing SUSH to the region.

"[We have advocated] for greater access to higher education opportunities in Playford, recognising the transformative impact education has on individuals and communities," he said.

"Study hubs play a vital role in breaking down barriers to education, equipping residents with the skills and qualifications they need to access meaningful employment opportunities and build brighter futures."

Federal Minister for Education Jason Clare said SUSH would lead to better outcomes in

"That's why we are doubling the number of university study hubs, to bring university closer to people in our outer suburbs and regions," Mr Clare said.

"We know they work. The evidence is they increase the number of people going to uni and finishing a uni degree.'

The Elizabeth SUSH expected to be operational by mid-2025.

Community focus key for chief executive

BEING approachable and getting the lie of the land will be two key starting points for Town of Gawler's new chief executive as he settles into his role.

On Monday, November 18, new chief executive Chris Cowley officially took the reins at Town of Gawler.

Ahead of his first day on the job, Mr Cowley said he wants to focus on approachability to help improve the community's access to and experiences with council.

"It's a bit of a cliché to say I've got an open door policy, but it's true," he said.

"One of the things I'll be looking to do is looking at ways I can actively meet and greet and engage with members of the community should they wish to have a conversation.

"I pride myself on being able to interact with all parts of the community. People will see me out and about, I'll be getting as involved as time will allow me."

Alongside that approachable intent, Mr Cowley said he wants to boost customer service and workplace culture at council, which he believes will lead to improved outcomes for the community.

"I'll be looking to have extremely positive culture within the workforce and ultimately that will reflect on how we interact with the community," he said.

With challenges ahead of him, including managing council's financial situation, predicted growth and potential boundary reform, Mr Cowley said he brought plenty of experience to the table from his time with City of Burnside.

"Handling growth pressures was a key learning from Burnside, which will translate through to Town of Gawler," he said.

"The overarching thing is local government is all about community. We should never lose sight of that, that the goal is to enhance people's wellbeing, improve where they live, make people proud of their locale.

"I believe the future for Gawler is bright, we just have to work out which approach is required based on the relevant outcomes."

Instead of blazing away on any plans, though, Mr Cowley said he wanted to first take the time to understand the people of Gawler, their expectations, and council's landscape.

"I tend to like to understand the lie of the land before I take action. I've seen too many incoming CEOs shake things up before they understand the landscape and I don't believe that works," he said.

"I will make the tough decisions should they be required, but I just need to know I'm making the right decision and that takes a

little bit of time."

Outside of his role with council, Mr Cowley said he and his partner are looking to make Gawler their "forever home" and become a permanent part of the community.

He said he was eager to join one of the muay thai gyms in town and potentially get involved in Gawler Park Run, while possibly joining a car or motorbike club in town with his partner.

"For me, this isn't just a job. I've taken the role because I want Gawler to become my community," he




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Hope Cup winners all stars to successful skipper



THE Riverside All-Stars thwarted the Gawler Police XI's plans for a Hope Cup three-peat following a comprehensive win at Sandy Creek on Sunday, November 17.

The third instalment of the annual Hope Cup charity cricket match saw a complete reversal of fortunes for the All-Stars, with the team securing its maiden win.

Gawler Police XI started off the day with the bat, posting a defendable total which saw the All-Stars requiring 160 runs to snag a

While previous editions of the game saw 160 as a very competitive total, the All-Stars only required around half of the allotted 40 overs to chase down their opposition's score

Riverside Salvation Army church leader and All-Stars skipper Darren Dwyer said he was "absolutely over the moon" to see his side finally secure the cup.

"I think as a unit we played really well. The fielding was sharp, there were no dropped catches, the running was great," he said.

Mr Dwyer highlighted the efforts of two players in particular, with Callum Byford and *The Bunyip* editor Ben Lennon receiving a lot of praise.

"We had two retires because they both hit 50 – that was Ben and Callum and I think we only lost two wickets," he said.

"Callum scored 50 off about six overs, and Ben slowly picked it up with twos and threes. It was a good performance all round and all the

team have said they're raring to go for next year."

Defeated Police XI captain Senior Sergeant Rob Mowday acknowledged a great performance from his opposition, but said he would not bank on the All-Stars hanging onto the cup for long. He said the event has so much room for growth in the future too.

"I think the event continues to grow and improve as a monument in our community and we know it still has so much scope to get bigger and better," SS Mowday said.

"It's important to remember that this event is for everyone in our community and is owned by everyone in our community.

"So, anyone can be involved as a player, sponsor, supporter, volunteer, or contributor in some other way."

With the aim of the day to raise vital funds to support rough sleepers in Gawler, Mr Dwyer said this year's Hope Cup got about halfway towards its goal of purchasing a Tiny Built unit for short-stay accommodation.

"A great amount raised by the teams – about \$23,000 at the moment. So add that to what we know is coming with cheques and the launch, we have definitely cleared \$32,000 and we haven't even done the takings from [the game]," he said.

"Obviously we've got quite a few expenses with the activities we had, but hoping for about \$35,000.

"[Member for Spence] Matt Burnell is going to start canvassing and see if we can get a partner to come and pay the other half [for a Tiny Built home]."

The Succession Act 2023 is set to come into effect on 1 January 2025 and brings major significant changes to South Australia's succession laws. This new Act replaces three existing laws: the Administration and Probate Act 1919, the Inheritance (Family Provision) Act 1972, and the Wills Act 1936 and varies other legislation. These reforms are the biggest changes to South Australia's succession laws in over 50 years, so people need to understand the changes and how they might impact them. Here's a brief snapshot of what you need to know about some of the upcoming changes.

Key Changes to Wills and Inheritance Claims

Under the new law, certain classes of people now have the right to inspect a deceased person's will before a Grant of Probate is made. These include beneficiaries, former spouses, children, and anyone who has a legitimate interest in the estate.

The Act also changes the rules regarding inheritance claims. The deceased person's wishes are now the primary consideration in family provision claims, and certain parties, like stepchildren, will be able to make claims more easily. 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Educator award STEMs from creative passion



A GAWLER teacher's curiosity and creativity have seen her recognised as one of South Australia's leading educators at the 2024 SA Science Excellence and Innovation Awards.

Xavier College teacher Jess Simons was recently named the 2024 STEMM Educator of the Year – Primary/Secondary.

Ms Simons, who was nominated while teaching at Trinity College, received recognition for her contributions to the school's STEM programs and ability to engage students in their learning.

After winning the award, Ms Simons said she was "shocked" as she thought her fellow nominees were doing incredible work.

She credited her win to her love of teaching students how to be creative in solving problems and looking at new ways of doing things.

"I was head of maths at Trinity, but my real passion has been looking at different ways of doing things to engage students and teachers in learning," she said.

"I was always trying to find interesting and different ways to present maths and science and all



the STEM subjects.

"From there, I had a passion for technology and digital stuff as well so I was able to kind of marry them together."

Now at Xavier, Ms Simons is leading her fellow staff members through learning and embracing new ideas and technologies, including virtual reality (VR) and artificial intelligence (AI).

She said staff members were excited by the possibilities and often approached her to discuss new ideas of their own.

"Being able to upskill staff and engage students in a different environment with that previous knowledge, so it's been a really great opportunity to be able to explore the needs of this college," she said.

"The staff here are very excited and there is a bit of a fire in them to improve and build upon what they've started."

With the excitement to learn came the need to tweak a few perceptions, though.

Ms Simons said she has conducted surveys around learning with students, and the perceptions of how to define creativity have certainly changed in a few short months.

"The comments... at the start of the research, what we saw was they had no idea what creativity actually was," she said.

"When answering the questions around creativity, they were saying it's creating art, it's just drawing. Their understanding of creativity adapted and evolved.

"By the end... I gave the same survey and the statistical difference between the results was quite significant. They really understood and were able to unpack creativity."

She said that creativity was vital to not only learning but building curiosity and the desire for students to take the next steps.

"In mathematics, science, creativity underpins everything that they do. Creativity... is understanding a problem and unpacking it in a new and different, unique way," she said.

"It's not just learning numbers, it's not just learning facts — it's the skills you need for everything in life.

"As a society, understanding how we learn about the world and how we go about the world is super important for us to build into our young people."

Looking ahead, Ms Simons said she was not quite sure how to top being named the STEMM Educator of the Year, but she was eager to continue exploring new technologies and learning alongside her colleagues and students

Tree removal under way at historic park

A NUMBER of trees will soon be removed from the Ayling and Dwyer Lime Kiln Park after an independent safety assessment found significant white ant damage and rot.

Town of Gawler Mayor Karen Redman said council has begun essential upgrades at the park, which includes the removal and replacement of multiple trees.

"Tree removal is now underway, following an assessment by an independent arboriculture consultancy which identified significant white ant damage, rot, and the need for pruning under powerlines," she said.

"The removal of these trees will make way for healthier, more suitable species to be planted in autumn 2025, enhancing shade and overall amenity for the community.

"In the meantime, a shade structure will be installed over the renewed play space, providing immediate sun protection for the summer."

The works at the park also include a renovation of the existing play space.

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More support needed for small businesses

A SMALL business roundtable at Kapunda on Monday, November 18, has revealed small business owners need more support to focus on their core activities rather than administrative tasks.

Hosted by Minister for Small and Family Business Andrew Michaels, more than 30 local business owners across the Gawler, Barossa and Light regions discussed their current challenges and whether South Australia's Small Business Strategy 2023-2030 is effectively promoting growth.

Business owners in the region emphasised the strain of compliance on issues on their limited staff. Member for Light Tony Piccolo attended the roundtable at the Kapunda Football Club and said the resources of small businesses in rural communities often reflected the performance of the rural industries and activities around them.

"Small business policies need to reflect the context in which the business is operating," he said.

"Drought conditions and frosts not only affect the farmers and grape growers, but also the small businesses in the towns who supply them with goods and services.

"The roundtable heard that small businesses in country towns often find it difficult to manage their cashflows when the region is not doing well."

Business owners also identified support with marketing and sales training would be well received, particularly knowing how to take advantage of the various digital platforms

Mr Piccolo said while it is important

to have a presence on the internet, small business investment in online marketing is only worthwhile if it leads to an increase in "foot traffic" and sales.

"Some small businesses are finding it difficult to achieve a strong digital presence, because of the way their business is structured," he said.

"Knowing and understanding your market and using the right language to reach them is critical.

"Small businesses need a range of supports that are flexible enough to meet the needs of different business in different context."

Mr Piccolo said the roundtable heard that some small businesses in some industries often suffered from poor perception, with consumers thinking that services are better provided by bigger companies.

"The feedback received from the various roundtables held in regional areas will inform the review of the State Government's Small and Family Business Strategy," he said.

Misconceptions hindering progress

NEW research from Planet Ark has uncovered a wide-spread misunderstanding among Australians about what happens to their recycling, with about one in three, or 31 per cent, mistakenly believing that most items in their recycling bins end up in landfill.

This misconception stands

in contrast to reality, with most correct items placed in recycling bins successfully processed and recycled.

Approximately 80 per cent of all items placed in household recycling bins are recycled, with about 14 per cent not recycled due to being contaminated (items that shouldn't be placed there in the first place).

Only the remaining six per cent is not recycled due to breakage or process inefficiencies.

Participants in the research also identified knowledge that most of their recycling was being processed and recycled appropriately as the primary reason people would be more motivated to increase recycling at home.

This suggests the misinformation surrounding recycling in landfill is a significant detractor from people's recycling efforts and continues to undermine public confidence in the recycling system.

The persistence of these myths and the mistrust they cause hinders progress on the significant waste challenges Australia faces.

It's vital that Australians know their efforts to recycle do make a difference.

The vast majority of correctly recycled items do not go to land-fill, and the system in place is effective at recovering valuable resources, reducing greenhouse gas emissions and cutting down on the need for raw material extraction.

In response to these findings, Planet Ark is redoubling efforts to provide educational resources to clarify what can and can not be recycled at home, information on items that can be recycled through product stewardship schemes, and how to reduce waste through reuse and repair initiatives.

National Recycling Week, which ran from November 11 to 17, presents an important opportunity for Australians to gain a clearer understanding of the recycling process and to correct false assumptions.



She was born on October 1, 1924 in Whyalla, the second daughter of Len and Jean Lismore, and married John Watson at Port Augusta on June 30, 1945.

They had two children, Robert and Jennifer, and in 1959 they left Port August and purchased the lease on the Roseworthy Hotel, which they had for four

After their lease was finished, they had a short break and then leased the Willaston Hotel in 1963.

After a trip to Western Australia, John could see the potential of entertainment for the younger generation and invested in a jukebox and renovations to the lounge area, which became a popular hang out spot for the younger people of Gawler.

Claire has had many stories to tell of the characters that frequented the pub over the years, like Dick, one of the regulars who, one afternoon, had a few too many and Claire ordered him out, only for him to come back with a big bunch of soursobs the next day.

Claire and John had that pub for eight years until John got very ill and they left in 1972, and Claire was left a widow at 48-years-old.

She settled in Gawler and after a couple of years went back working at the Old Spot Hotel in Salisbury, then the Old Bushman Hotel in Gawler, before retiring in

She remained very busy helping family, gardening, sewing and volunteering.

Claire was involved with the Willaston Football Club, cooking teas and following her grandson Gary playing football.

She also followed harness racing, having a lifelong interest as her mother's family, the Fullers, was very involved in training and racing, as was her son Robert.

When first married, John was very involved in setting up the harness racing at Port Augusta and the track was named in his honour.

Claire also volunteered at meetings at Gawler in the supper rooms.

She has two children, six grandchildren, 14 great grandchildren and four great, great grandchildren.

She is also a step-grandma to three grandchildren, eight great grandchildren and 10 great, great grandchildren.

Business owner seeks to identify Hewett vandal

A GAWLER business owner is calling on the community to help find a serial vandal who has defaced a number of signs, businesses and buildings in recent weeks.

Hewett shopping centre owner Maria Romano has put a public call out for help in identifying a vandal who has tagged shops, street signs, and even the new ambulance station site.

Ms Romano described the tagging as disrespectful and said she wants to see the person responsible held accountable.

"It's like a personal attack on

your property and disrespect on a total stranger," she said.

"The shopping centre there is for everyone in the community and they just don't have any respect for it.

"It's unsightly and people take pride in their own properties. To see vandalism around the place is not very nice."

While Ms Romano has reported the vandalism to police and provided CCTV footage, she said it was hard to identify someone without community help.

"I encourage everyone, if they know or think they know who it might be, report it to the police station," she said.

"They should be held accountable for their actions.

"I don't think anyone else would want that happening to their properties, so the more people are held accountable, the less people will do it hopefully."

Gawler police officer in charge Senior Sergeant Rob Mowday encouraged community members to report graffiti to police alongside taking small steps to help prevent it.

"Graffiti is not art – it is a criminal offence that involves offenders vandalising the property of others without consent," he said.

"Graffiti prevention can be achieved in a number of ways such as ensuring lighting is working correctly, consider sensi-lights, applying graffiti resistant coatings, utilise CCTV where possible, limit access to areas that are likely targets of vandals, keep trees and shrubs trimmed to reduce concealment and keeping spray cans and such things that can be stolen secured at all times.

"Obviously if vandalism occurs, or people identify any suspicious behaviour, report the matter to police as soon as possible."

Playford local shines hope on holiday struggle

WHEN former City of Playford Young Citizen of the Year Dylan Davies was a child, he said the older generation promised things would get better by the time he was an adult.

Now 26 years old and freshly moved out of home, Mr Davies said the cost of living pressures on the northern suburbs have never been greater.

With his community spirit and genuine want to help others in time for the holiday season, Mr Davies has taken to social media with his own plea to raise money for those struggling this Christmas.

Earlier this month, Mr Davies created a GoFundMe page, calling on the community to give anything they can in an effort to help those worse off.

Mr Davies said he is no stranger to poverty and will do anything in his power to help someone going through something similar.

"My family has always struggled with money, and having just moved out, I am now reminded of just how intense the cost of living pressures are," he said.

"Once you pay rent, it's hard to find the money to even eat, to be honest.

"It makes me think how families with children are surviving when I'm even struggling with the cost of living this much.

"People are always struggling this time of the year as well over Christmas, so many people stress because they can't afford gifts for their families or to host a dinner.

"The cost of everything all adds up so

fast, no one has an extra \$45 for a ham this Christmas."

Mr Davies was awarded the City of Playford Young Citizen of the Year in 2017 for his efforts in helping others overcome the effects of bullying, and his community spirit has not wavered since.

"I was always bullied in high school, and I took the opportunity to educate students on how to cope with bullying and was so lucky to win the young citizen award a few years ago," he said.

"Now I think, if I was able to achieve something like that, why stop there?

"I want to take that momentum and do something that can make a difference for the community."

Having relied on charitable services in the past, Mr Davies has also taken time to volunteer with programs across Playford.

"I have seen first-hand how many people rely on places like Foodbank and charities just to get by," he said.

"My family has also had to use these services before, and they're so critical for the community here in Playford and across the north.

"I want to make it my mission to create something like this that can help others and I want to give back to the community that has helped me so much."

Along with the essentials such as bread, milk and other groceries, Mr Davies said he also wants money raised to go towards women in poverty who struggle to access vital period products.

"I have sisters, aunties and important women in my life, and I see just how hard it is for them to get access to certain healthcare and products they need," he said.

"It should not be hard for women to get these essentials."



Although Mr Davies has not received too many monetary donations just yet, he said the community has already been a great help.

"I have lived in the northern suburbs my entire life, and there is something different about the community here," he said.

"We all come together when people are in need, everyone has a real sense of community and are happy to help out.

"Although I haven't gotten a lot of donations

yet, I have received a lot of support from the community, which has been fantastic, and not everyone can give money at the moment.

"The community here understands the struggle though, and hopefully by Christmas if I can even take some stress from one family, that would be worth it.

"I want people to hear my story and feel inspired to get out there and do the same – we're all in this together."



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

Household concessions available

TIME is running out for South Australians on low or fixed incomes to apply for a range of household concessions for the 2024-25 financial year.

More than 215,000 households currently access household concessions, with support including payments for cost-of-living, energy, water, sewerage, medical heating and cooling, and the Emergency Services Levy.

Minister for Human Services Nat Cook said many low or fixed-income households are doing it tough with the rising cost of living.

"We know about a quarter of households in South Australia already access the range of concessions including cost-of-living, water, energy and sewerage, but there are many more households that would be eligible," she said.

It is believed that thousands of households who are eligible to receive concessions have not yet applied.

The deadline for 2024-25 cost-of-living concession applications is December 31, 2024.

New applicants can apply online at www.sa.gov.au/concessions or phone the Concessions SA hotline on 1800 307 758 to have an application posted.

New partners in the pipeline

A TRIO of specialist pipeline companies have signed up to support the delivery of SA Water's \$3.3 billion capital program, which primarily targets Adelaide's north.

Announced on Monday, BMD, Diona and Leed Engineering and Construction will share in up to \$700 million worth of work over the next four years, including laying trunk water and sewer pipes that will enable new houses to be built.

The capital program includes a \$1.5 billion investment, announced as a key initiative of the Premier's Housing Roadmap, to increase capacity of the water and sewer network through upgrades to pipes, pump stations and tanks to unlock a potential 40,000 new allotments across the state.

Infrastructure projects will mainly target Adelaide's northern growth front, including areas such as Angle Vale, Riverlea and Roseworthy to maximise the number of new houses enabled through this investment.

Leed Engineering and Construction is already poised to start pre-construction work to inform the alignment for new underground trunk water mains, which are set to be installed from early 2025 and will unlock capacity for new houses in Angle Vale.

"The Malinauskas Government is investing in the state's future, by providing essential housing infrastructure and long-term job security for our skilled workforce," Minister for Housing and Urban Development Nick Champion said.

"Work is already underway on this fouryear project, with the first pipes going in the ground in the northern suburbs.

"These companies will play a pivotal role in delivering the record capital program which will build network capacity and enable future expansion.

"This investment will create hundreds of local jobs and future opportunities for SA subcontractors."

THE Tanunda Kegel Club clubhouse will undergo an upgrade to ensure its longevity into the future.

The Barossa Council announced it would rebuild the clubhouse located at Tanunda Recreation Park, with the project valued at \$235,000, which includes a new external

Council is working closely with the club and a heritage architect to ensure the clubhouse retains its heritage characteristics, while addressing termite damage.

The rebuilt facility will have the same footprint and design as the existing state heritage listed building, with the addition of a verandah at the front, while the historic alley will be retained.

The heritage architect has consulted with Heritage SA to ensure the upgraded building will meet state heritage requirements and materials have been chosen to match the current building.

This includes a galvanised iron roof, beige weatherboard exterior and the retention of the trademark timber sliding doors.

The project also includes improvements to enhance the functionality of the kitchen and improve accessibility.

Work is expected to commence mid-2025, pending development application approval.



NAWMA sparks fire concerns

NORTHERN Adelaide Waste Management Authority (NAWMA) has partnered with Green Industries SA to encourage the northern community to get batteries out of their bins.

The free recycling event, open to all South Australian residents, aims to share the dangers of throwing batteries in the bin.

Batteries cause a number of risks to the local waste and recycling industry, including battery fires, which can quickly become deadly during the summer months.

There have been more than 10,000 fires and fire events across Australia in the past year related to batteries incorrectly placed in kerbside bins.

The trial event will focus on "difficult to recycle" and "hard to access" embedded batteries, particularly lithium-ion batteries.

Recycling sites will be open across the state for residents to drop off their batteries, including the Edinburgh North Resource Recovery Centre from 9am until 3pm on November 23 and 24.

Surge in fatal virus prompts vaccination plea

VETS across the northern suburbs are urging households to vaccinate their dogs after an alarming uptick in canine parvovirus cases were found in Playford.

The often fatal viral disease has been found across the northern suburbs, including in Andrews Farm, Elizabeth Grove and Elizabeth South.

The highly contagious disease, that targets mostly puppies and unvaccinated dogs, causes symptoms such as a loss of appetite, severe or repeated vomiting and diarrhoea.

RSPCA senior veterinarian Fauve Buckley said the virus is a "nasty'

"It's a really smart virus as well - when it's ingested, it works its way into the stomach and causes some harsh symptoms like diarrhoea and vomiting, but then it makes its way into the bone marrow which means the body struggles to fight back," Dr Buckley said.

"When this happens, the dog can no longer produce enough white blood cells needed to fight the infection.

acts really fast."

The disease withstand unfortunately routine cleaning and weather changes, which means the spread is often hard to control.

It can be easily transferred from paws to shoes and contaminated outdoor items,

and is shed in the faeces of infected animals.

"We see a lot of it pop up this time of year because it thrives in soil where it's not too hot or too cold, so the warmer spring months is when we see more cases," Dr Buckley said.

"When the weather is

nicer, people are just out more too, which means more dogs in parks and possibly ingesting and spreading the virus."


The virus, although at times fatal, can be treated with a number of medications and intravenous fluids to support the dog through the

Dr Buckley said although the illness can be treated with hard work, aggressive cases can lead to devastating

"My best advice would be for people to get their pets vaccinated, and to build a relationship with your local vets," she said.

"It's important that people visit their vets, and keep up these vaccinations and boosters that will lower the chances of your pet catching the virus, and its symptoms.

"There are so many wonderful vets out there who are ready to help."

Little heroes dive into water safety

SUPER men and women made a splash at Playford's Aquadome last week to promote water safety among the community in time for the summer season.

Children swapped their usual swimming lesson attire to super hero costumes to emphasise how water safety is a serious mission.

Under the playful theme is a crucial message behind the concerninsg statistics of drowning incidents among children aged zero to four.

The Royal Life Saving National Drowning Report 2024 indicates that a significant 60 per cent of drowning deaths in this age group result from falls by activity.

The team at Aquadome in accordance with BlueFit Swimming said these figures underline a need for improved safety measured around bodies of water, especially where young children could be at risk during the holiday season.

BlueFit South Australian regional swim school manager Jasmin Rogers said real water safety training needs to include different scenarios that children might encounter, like accidental falls into water, which often happens while

dressed in everyday clothing.

"We want to teach kids how to enter the water safely and simulate the experience of them on holiday over the summer season," she said.

"We teach them how to be in the water with the extra weight of clothes on – if they're out fishing with the family, they're going to have normal clothing on, and we want to teach them how to safely swim if they were to fall in.

"We want the feeling to become normal so they don't freak out if it was to happen during summer."

The classes focuses on essential survival skills including floating, treading water and performing survival stokes all while fully clothed.

Ms Rogers said these classes shine a light on vital skills that can potentially save someone's life.

"We host our safety week program twice a year, and it becomes more popular every year, which is really good to see," she said.

"These classes are so important because it's not all about learning how to do a perfect freestyle down a 50-meter pool, but about learning fundamental safety practices that these kids will take into their teenage years as well."

SA residents encouraged to join national koala survey

SOUTH Australian citizen scientists are being called on to help researchers count the state's koala population as part of a national program aimed at better protecting the iconic marsupial.

The 2024 SA Great Koala Count kicked off on Saturday, November 16, and the State and Federal Governments are encouraging residents to participate in the week-long survey.

People can take part using the CSIRO's 'Koala Spotter' app, which allows everyone to record and monitor koalas in their local area.

The data is fed directly into the \$10 million National Koala Monitoring Program (NKMP), which is funded by the Federal Government and led by the CSIRO

The intention is to use the data from the count to inform future koala conservation and management efforts across both South Australia and the rest of the country.

"Koalas are an iconic, native species that are synonymous with Australia," Minister for Climate, Environment and Water Susan Close said.

"The data collected in the SA Great Koala Count will be vital in helping to inform both national and state conservation and management efforts into the future.

"This is also a great opportunity to have some fun with the family by heading out to explore some of our state's most beautiful natural environments... which are right on the city's doorstep."

Climate reporting is here: How agribusiness can thrive

THE Australian Government has officially passed legislation to mandate climate-related reporting from January 2025.

The Treasury Laws Amendment (Financial Market Infrastructure and Other Measures) Bill (the bill) passed senate in late August, and gained the House of Representatives' approval on September 9, solidifying its enactment into law.

Large businesses (Group 1) such as banks and major retailers will, from as soon as next year, be required to report on Scope 3 emissions, meaning direct implications for agribusinesses.

Scope 3 emissions are those acquired from suppliers, and therefore are included in a business's own emissions caused by their own operations, increasing their total reportable carbon baseline.

For farms of any size that supply to supermarket chains and other large or medium entities, a low-or-neutral carbon footprint becomes a competitive advantage and a value-add.

A carbon-neutral supplier becomes the supplier of choice given the recipient business is now required to capture and report a carbon footprint via the supply chain.

Agile farmers who respond swiftly to the demand will be ready to increase the chances of protecting their current customer contracts, and may be able to entice new customers. Bentleys SA/NT partner and agribusiness advisory specialist James Allen said they are seeing clients getting preferred supplier status and longerterm contracts as a result of reducing or offsetting their carbon baseline.

"Forward-thinking agribusinesses are paying to have this done as they see the commercial benefits," Mr Allen said.

The argument for carbon emission reduction goes beyond simple legal compliance, environmental mindfulness

and marketing advantage.

Banks and insurers are increasingly wanting to see carbon neutrality as an indicator of business longevity and sustainability.

With specialist advice, carbon footprint can not only be measured, verified and reported on, but identifying emissions sources enables strategies to reduce, offset or mitigate carbon emissions and reduce operational costs.

Carbon credits are another opportunity for large emitters that wish to improve their baselines for verification and reporting.

"Some farms will produce excess credits and be able to sell to these markets after reducing their baseline to nil," Mr Allen

"Many more higher-intensity farms, however, will have a footprint that needs to be reduced. Those are likely already looking towards reducing their footprint and can look to work towards increasing sequestration practices across their operations via soil, trees and herd management methods.

"It is our job as advisors to explore the many options, and oftentimes farmers don't realise they are already doing many of the right things and just need the clarification.

"The process of getting a baseline helps farmers identify where the problems are at, establish what can be done to reduce the emissions and start a longer-term project to sequester more carbon across their farming enterprise. The combination of these, will in most cases assist in getting the farm to a largely neutral position."

For a time-poor industry at the mercy of the seasons and required to wear multiple hats at the best of times, the good news is carbon assessment and reporting can be managed with minimal labour.

q Scope 2: Purchased/acquired energy such as electricity, solar energy and renewable energy used is funneled into data form, producing a number attributable to Scope 2 carbon emissions.

q Scope 3: Supply chain emissions relating to the supply chain is funnelled into data form, producing a number attributable to Scope 3 carbon emissions.

q Carbon stocks (assets) such as trees and soil are subtracted from the sum of Scope 1, 2 and 3 providing the farm's net annual carbon emissions.

The above process may involve use of soil probes, energy monitors and other tools. This input talks directly to the carbon baseline technology, producing a live report and chart that the client can view at any time.

Based on the carbon baseline report, the advisor can recommend strategies for the client to save on energy consumption, reduce wastage and reduce costs. The farmer is surprised to learn that they are already doing many of the right things to keep their carbon baseline low, for example using solar energy and recycling. They learn where their emissions are high, and what might be done to reduce them. They learn where they are producing the greatest return on investment.

The relationship is solidified, the farm's products gain the best real-estate on the supermarket shelves, consumption increases and product demand increases.

Further, the farm's produce becomes more attractive to overseas markets where demand for carbon neutral products is particularly high, and exports increase.

The farm wishes to expand production and seeks a loan from the bank and additional insurance. The bank and insurer see the farm's carbon neutrality as an indicator of business longevity and sustainability, and respond favourably.

With a thriving farming enterprise backed by advisory support and live data, the farm's succession outlook becomes brighter. The advisor assists the farm in succession and legacy planning for future generations.

Local gym tears through State Championships

GAWLER South's The Station Gymnasium cleaned up at the recent Boxing SA State Championships in Adelaide, entering six fighters and walking away with four gold medals

Annabel Gatti, Hunter Carroll, William Godwin and his father Mick Godwin were the four members to collect gold, giving the local establishment plenty to celebrate.

Gym owner and head coach Kirsty Gregory detailed how each of the winners made their way through the field.

"First up we had Annabel, who is 12 years old, 60kgs and coached by her father Paul Gatti, who represented Australia in the 1990 Commonwealth games as a heavyweight boxer," she said.

"Annabel won her title unopposed and did a special bout with an older, more experienced girl, and although she didn't get the win she showed real heart.

"Next we had William Godwin, a 57kg junior novice boxer, who took on a talented boxer from Fortus Team Gym in an exciting fight that was voted Fight of the Night by the judges.

"William boxed beautifully, getting stronger each round, and his last round was a 10-8 in his favour to take the gold. William steps up to intermediate next year and will be an exciting boxer to watch.

"Then we had Hunter Carroll in the junior novice 50kg final. Hunter fought at last year's state titles and lost in a very, very close split-decision that resulted in him taking a bit of break from competition.

"He returned mid-year, but this was his first time back in the ring in 12 months. He fought very well, listening to instructions and keeping his composure against a tough opponent from Fortus Team Gym, and it resulted in him winning a well-deserved gold medal.

"Hunter will also be one to watch next year as he refines his slick boxing style.

"Finally, we had Mick Godwin, William's dad, fighting in the 71kg master novice category. He had his first fight at the Club Championships national competition in May, where he didn't perform how he would have liked.

"This time he took on an opponent from Rose Boxing Club and he wasn't leaving anything to chance. He came out a little slow, but he put the guy on the canvas with a beautiful right hand in the second round and dominated in the third to take the gold medal.

"Lacey Linke was also nominated as a junior novice at 66kg for state titles and has trained so hard, making massive improve-



ments this year, but unfortunately she did not get a match.

"She is such a tough, dynamic fighter who is great to watch in action. It's just so hard for girls to get matches in boxing due to the small number of women who compete."

Gregory believes her pupils have been so successful because of the combination of solid fundamentals and the creative licence to be unique in the ring.

"I teach a very technical style of boxing and Pat is great fight coach, so our boxers get the best of both worlds," she said.

"I believe in having a strong foundation of basic boxing skills for at least the first four or five fights, so we work a lot of drills and footwork, but after they have some experience I encourage them to develop their own unique style and use what works best for them.

"Our boxers put in the hard work, they came to all the sparring sessions, they did the cardio, they were out doing hill sprints on weekends. They all boxed with heart and the desire to win.

"We have a strong team now; they are all working together and getting better every week and I'm hoping to have a few more of our elite boxers in next year."

With the opportunities set to follow a batch of State Championship golds, the gym is hopeful some new sponsors will get on board to help their young guns travel the country –

or even the world.

"We are currently seeking sponsors to help give these young athletes the opportunity to compete interstate, and maybe even internationally next year," Gregory said.

"Currently, all fees and travel expenses are covered by myself, Pat and the boxers or their families. Businesses are welcome to sponsor individual athletes, or the gym with several different packages available.

NORTHERN Districts' senior men will hope to quickly wash away the stench of Saturday's outright loss against Prospect, which catapulted the victorious side right to the top of the Men's 1st Grade Division 2 ladder.

It was always the likely outcome after the Jets fell victim to a ridiculous spell from Prospect's Kyle Scrimegour (9/27 from 10.1 overs) on day one, finishing all out for just 78.

Again Scrimegour was the spearhead of the Prospect attack, taking 5/30 from 17.4 overs to finish with outrageous match figures of 14/57 from 18 overs.

Requiring just 20 runs to complete the outright result, Prospect still somehow lost four wickets on the way, but finished the job in the 10th over.

The Jets seniors will be looking to bounce back this weekend in a Saturday-Sunday two-day matchup at home against Southern District, who sit last on the ladder through three rounds.

One player who could be joining Northern Districts' top side for that clash is reserves captain Cameron Williams, who put together a massive 120 not-out from 196 balls to lead a 20-run win over Prospect in the twos.

Williams then handled a substantial workload with the ball, taking a teambest 3/62 from a team-leading 22.1 overs.

Women

With the under 15 girls having the weekend off the only action from the Jets ladies came in the seniors, where they put together a dominant 85-run win against Adelaide University in a shortened outing.

Cut back to 19 overs each after a

wet pitch delayed the start, Northern Districts batted first and posted a target of 2/153 thanks to great showings from Evelyn Todd (59 from 47 balls), Jessica Paley (32 not-out from 24 deliveries) and captain Eloise Jansen (20 from 43).

Despite having licence to swing hard and score fast in the abbreviated contest, Adelaide Uni could only crawl their way to 4/68 when time expired as Maya Klose (2/13 from four overs), Sarah Cameron (1/5 from two overs) and Evelyn Todd (1/20 from four overs) made things difficult.

Junior Boys

Unfortunately for the Jets' junior grades there was a trio of losses in the under 15.5, under 14 and under 13 grades, with the highest score coming from the 13s.

Chasing a substantial 40-over total of 9/217, Saish Valani (27 from 30 balls), George Gogoll (23 from 54) and Veer Patel (23 from 38) tried their best to mount a fightback, but ultimately time ran out 78 runs short on

Meanwhile, in the 14s it was the Jets who were tasked with defending a total of 135 against Sturt.

Bhavy Patel (2/21 from eight overs) removed two of Sturt's top three batters for a solid start, and Ashvarn Singh Sidhu (3/28 from 11 overs) had plenty of success through the middle-order, but after building a platform of 5/110 Sturt was able to patiently pass the target with three wickets to spare.

Rounding out the action was the most decisive defeat of the junior grades, being forced to bat for time on day two to avoid an outright loss to Sturt.

Sturt coasted to the first-innings result after answering Northern Districts' score of 54 with 2/270, and with 50 overs of play remaining the Jets had to avoid losing another 10 wickets.

Noah Murch (26 from 55 balls) and Prabhsimran Singh (26 from 39) were the Jets to find some form as they reached stumps at 7/110 to limit the damage.

THE surprise stars of the Para District Cricket Association continued their remarkable run on Saturday as Adelaide Hazara came within one wicket of a dominant outright victory against North Pines.

Adelaide Hazara – who did not have a team in last year's Grade 1 competition – has been the dominant force through Round 3.

In all three rounds the club has posted a total in the 300s, and defending 9/378 against North Pines the largely Afghan and Pakistani squad bowled out their opponents for 93 in 27 overs.

Ejaz Nijadi (4/28 from nine overs) led the charge along with Muhammad Mehdi (3/34 from six overs), and with 43 more overs before stumps North Pines were sent straight back in to try and avoid the outright

The home side did just enough to avoid losing 20 wickets in a day, reaching the end of play at 9/101 after Nijadi (4/30 from 11 overs) and Mushtaq Hussein (2/6 from five overs) again had

their way with the ball.

The only other team in the division with a perfect 3-0 record is Angle Vale, who had a more manageable target of 165 to track down against ATCO.

Aaron Meredith finally came back down to earth for Angle Vale, falling for just 10 runs after scores of 113 not-out and 150 not-out from the first two rounds.

Picking up the slack was captain Justin Carman, who opened the batting and contributed a team-high 35 runs, and in a balanced team effort Jack Pessano (32 runs), Jamie Quirk (31), Matthew Ramsey (28), James Kelly (25) and Corey Dent (24) all made an impact.

The best individual performance of the round came from Salisbury West's Justin Davies, who backed up his 86 runs while opening the batting on day one with Round 4's best bowling figures, taking 5/60 from a team-high 16.4 overs.

Salisbury West ended up needing every bit of Davies's production, hanging on to beat Virginia by just 11 runs after John Natsias (55 from 66 balls) and Alex Leo (50 not-out from 94 deliveries) nearly

tracked down the total of 201.

Jack Hanson (3/36 from 11 overs) and Riley Cowen (1/1 from two overs) were the other Salisbury West bowlers to earn a mention

Rounding out the Grade 1 action was another thriller at Eyre Sports Park, where the Eyre Royals did enough to defend their 165 total for a five-run win over Craigmore

Craigmore appeared firmly in the driver's seat after number three Dylan Wilson (59 runs) and opener Matthew Baker (30) helped the visitors build a platform of 3/138

Captain Alan Hewitt also chipped in 38 runs after coming in at number five, but around him the middle-order collapsed horribly with three ducks and two players dismissed on scores of one.

That 3/138 quickly became 9/152, tasking the 10-11 tail-end partnership with collecting the final 16 runs, but Aaron Lord's third wicket ended it in the 64th over. Lord (3/22 from seven overs) and Nathaniel Brookes (4/23 from 12 overs) were the pick of the Royals on day two.

Stumpy's short shots

AT long last, having been bombarded by a tsunami of wokeness and political correctness, a glimmer of balance and sensibility is now being expressed by arguably the greatest middle-distance runner the world has ever seen, Lord Sebastian Coe.

Coe has nominated to head the International Olympic Committee (IOC). Much to his credit, he strongly references aspects of competitive sport and areas that concern him.

Setting out his platform for the

most powerful role in global sport, Coe has promised to protect the women's category by changing the International Olympic Committee's emphasis from human rights to the basic rules of biology.

The head of World Athletics, Coe is attempting to succeed Thomas Bach as IOC president next March, admitting he was "uncomfortable" when he watched two boxers win gold medals in Paris amidst confusing

gender controversy.

"It's a very clear proposition to me – if you do not protect the female category, or if you are in any way ambivalent about it for whatever reason, then it will not end well for women's sport," Coe said.

"I come from a sport where that is sacrosanct."

A key element of Coe's presidential manifesto will be to move the IOC away from its human rights-based approach to the issue, to a policy of separating elite women's sport for biological females only.

It is a shift he has implemented successfully in athletics, banning male-to-female transgender athletes from elite women's events while compelling those with differences in sexual development (DSD) to undergo a minimum of six months of testosterone suppression.

"It has to be a clear-cut policy,

and it is incumbent on the IOC to create that landscape," Coe said, who agreed that the existing guidance was ambiguous.

"I have been in training for this for most of my life. I think I can make a difference, and I do have a plan and a vision for what that difference looks like.

"I think change is necessary. We're in a fast-changing landscape, and change is crucial."

Bishop and Menzel maul Magpies

Heading into day two Kapunda was defending a handy score of 226, and the bowling duo of Dylan Bishop and Riley Menzel did not give Mallala a chance.

The pair combined to claim all 10 Magpie wickets in just 28 overs, and when they started to fall, they fell quick.

Mallala opener Jake Birchmore (15 from 54 balls) was the only member of his team to pass seven runs, helping his side crawl to 0/28 before the bombardment began.

Bishop removed Birchmore and went on to secure 6/10 from 4.5 overs, while Menzel delivered figures of 4/3 from seven overs as Mallala crashed out 174 runs short of the target on 52.

Despite the loss, at 2-3 Greenock still has a great chance to recover for a winning season.

from eight overs, before Matthew Hay (4/3 from 1.1 overs) stole the headline by cleaning up the tail in a flash.


Both Tanunda and Nuriootpa are seeking their first win of the season, and it will be the Magpies in the driver's seat when they get back underway.

Under 14s



Rounding out the topfour is Nuriootpa, who capitalised on Tanunda's loss to snatch their spot in the finals placings.



"The Adelaide event is pretty exciting for speedway, so I thought why not?"





All The Trix breaks through at Globe Derby

EXCITING young square-gaiter All The Trix stamped himself as a future star with a tough win in the 2024 Ladbrokes SA Square Trotters Association Gramel Trotters Cup (2645m) at Globe Derby Park on Saturday.

Trained by Claire Goble at Wasleys and driven by senior reinsman David Smith, All The Trix (\$5.50 into \$3.50 equal-favourite) sat parked in the staying event and held on to win by a long-head from Wishing Star (\$11), with Regal Attire (\$7.50) a short half-head away third.

The winner, only a four-year-old, is considered a juvenile in trotting terms, with the majority of square-gaiters not reaching their peak until around six or older.

All The Trix was bred and is owned in partnership by Goble and New South Wales council executive Paul Rofe.

Honouring South Australia's most famous trotter, Gramel – a champion in the 1960s who set 23 track records – has taken various guises since being introduced onto the calendar by Harness Racing South Australia in 1971.

It began as a three-race series before losing some of its prestige, and most recently being reinvented as the Gramel Trotters Cup, a race that can now grow to become the favourite it was when the legendary Knight Pistol was a three-time winner, once off a 50-metre handicap and the other two giving away 80-metre starts

For driver David Smith, 66, it was his first win in the Gramel Cup, joining his father Alan, who was successful in 1999 with Keystone Rule.

Smith said it had always been his intention to sit outside the leader with All The Trix.



"He had suffered early interference at his last two runs, and also in a trial," Smith said.

"So I wanted to trot away from his 10-metre handicap, stay wide and out of trouble, then let him trot around to sit parked.

"I sent him to the front 600 metres out and thought I would make the others chase him. In the straight I was thinking maybe I went a bit early, but when he was aware of the challenges he seemed to find another burst to win."

All The Trix was Goble's second win after being successful with Saybia back in 2009.

"All The Trix is certainly a talented young trotter and I'm excited about what he can do," Goble said.

"It is extra to special to have bred him, and it has been a long pathway, as it is with all horses to get him to the track.

"I have to thank Michael Dodd from Shea-Oak Log who breaks in all my horses – he does a wonderful job breaking them in and they always come back with magnificent manners.

"Also, Greg and in particular Ken Rogers, who drove him early and helped with his race manners."

Mount Gambier owner-breeder Andrew Clarke, Roseworthy trainer Toby Ryan and his reinsperson wife Lisa celebrated a big double with half-brothers Aintsobad and Ubetonred.

Both horses sat outside the leaders in their races and were tough enough to win.

Aintsobad (\$2.40 favourite) never really looked likely to win the 2024 Ladbrokes Veterinary Surgeons Cup (2230m) until the final 50 metres when he surged to grab a one-metre win from the pacemaker Springfield Affair (\$6.50).

Driver Lisa Ryan said during the race she had been aware of the front-running tactics of Gaita Pullicino on Springfield Affair.

"I knew Gaita would apply the pressure over the final lap and I was conscious of not letting her get away from me," Ryan said.

"On the home turn, with the backmarkers making their runs, I thought we were going to run an honourable third or fourth.

"But he has a real toughness and will to win and lifted over the final stages to score."

Trainer Toby Ryan said Aintsobad would now run in a heat of the Southern Cross for four-year-old and over entires & geldings on Sunday, November 24.

He added Ubetonred would contest the Southern Cross heat for three-year-old colts and geldings on Saturday, November 23.

"He may not be quite up to the class of a Bay Jim Major for example, but tonight he showed he has earnt the opportunity to have a go," Ryan said.

"He is an improver and has a toughness which could prove an asset."


A heavily backed \$1.70 favourite, Ubetonred, despite sitting tough, raced away to record a seven-metre win in the Naracoorte & Penola Veterinary Centres Three-Year-Old Pace (1800m) beating The Reginator (\$7.50).

Andrew Clarke believes Ubetonred will prove a better horse than Aintsobad.

"From the time I broke him in I felt he had a bit more upside," Clarke said.

"He had the strength of Aintsobad, and being only three, can only get better."

Clarke said his broodmare Dulcies Dilemma had just returned a positive test to the stallion Restrepo, the sire of Ubetonred and his other handy pacer Urabadboy.

THE SA greyhound racing industry is today mourning the passing of industry stalwart Angela Modra, who passed away on Friday aged 78.

Angela was an industry trailblazer for female greyhound trainers, having held a trainer's licence for nearly 60 years as one of the very first female trainers ever registered.

She made her start caring for animals when working as a vet nurse working for renowned greyhound veterinarian Jim Gannon while also clipping and grooming pets in the Warrandyte area.

Angela's early involvement in the industry was alongside fellow trailblazers, the late Karen Leek and Sandra Reed (daughter of legendary trainer Paul Hogan and a former Victorian GBOTA chair) and trained her first champion Lufra Boy in the 1960s, racing across Victoria and New South Wales.

Eventually moving to SA in the early 1990s and settling at a picturesque Gawler River property, Angela's lifetime in greyhounds was again rewarded when her pride and joy Silver Saul burst onto the national stage, emerging as one of the sport's biggest stars.

His ascent to the very top, which included the SA Sprint Championship, a third placing in the National Sprint final, a second place in the Australian Cup and representation twice in the Top Gun, was culminated by winning the Shootout in 2002, where he produced a sensational performance to win the then-Group 2

Following Silver Saul, Angela's impact on the industry continued in recent years as a very successful trainer and breeder, whilst also being a continual source of help and advice for anyone who needed it in the industry.

Greyhound Racing SA chief executive Brenton Scott said Angela had a profound impact on the industry.

"There are few people in our great industry that have impacted as positively as Angela was able to," Scott said.

"She proudly led the way for female trainers and her love for greyhounds, indeed all animals, was central to her training philosophy and no doubt the backbone of her considerable success

"Her willingness to guide and quietly help others without fuss or fanfare was inbuilt in her character... a great thinker, a genuine people-engager and the biggest of hearts.

"I doubt that anybody could have endured her challenging circumstances over the past six months as bravely and as selflessly as she did.

"All in the greyhound industry extend our condolences to partner Jack, son Mark and other family members on her passing. She will be sorely missed by so many."
