WORKS to upgrade one of the Playford area's most notorious intersections are set to begin in 2025 following the announcement of extra funding from the Federal Government. On Friday, November 22, the State and Federal Governments announced a funding partnership to kickstart works on the proposed Curtis Road and Heaslip Road intersection roundabout.

The intersection, which RAA once labelled as one of South Australia's riskiest intersections, will also see associated

road upgrades to improve safety and ease congestion.

The project is proposed to cost \$30 million, with \$15 million coming through the Federal Government's \$1 billion Housing Support Program (HSP).

Gawler group stitching awareness one tree at a time

TREES across Gawler have turned orange this week as part of the Zonta Club of Gawler's annual stand against domestic and family violence.

As part of the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence, Zonta members have been busy knitting large orange wraps and pom-poms to display on trees across Gawler.

The efforts aim to highlight the impact of domestic and family violence across Australia, with the bright orange colour to bring eyes to the campaign.

Zonta member Pam Young said raising awareness is at the core of the annual campaign.

"There are 16 Days of Activism, but with the yarn bombing, we're knitting allyear 'round, and by constantly working on it, we're constantly thinking and talking about the topic with other people," she said. "By having the bright orange colour

splashed around town, we hope this will also spark conversation and get people talking about it.

"We try to keep it in our minds well past the 16 Days of Activism because it needs to be a continued conversation.

"Our team have had several conversation today already while we've been here, because people walk past and want to know what we're doing, and then we can share our story and our aim with others."

Another member of the yarn bombing team, Beppy, said she has also decorated the tree outside her property in bright orange in an attempt to inspire others to do the same.

"My hope is that people will see the orange and spark up a conversation, and although I may be the only one with orange on my street, hopefully others will see, learn, and do the same next year," she said.

Beppy said at the end of the day, if even one more person can learn about domestic abuse or the impacts of violence against women, then the team has done its job well.

"We often see numbers of reported cases go up every year, that that could be because people are talking about it more, and can recognise the signs easier," she said.

"I've had someone who was in a very dangerous situation without even fully understanding it.

"It is conversations that come about during the 16 Days of Activism that might open someone's eyes to abuse and make a real impact on their lives."

Zonta is also set to host its annual vigil at the Pocket Park memorial on Thursday, November 28, and will talk with community members to continue its efforts in raising awareness.

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Road safety boost with roundabout funding

Member for Spence Matt Burnell said there was a lot of hard work behind the scenes to get the funding locked in.

"There's not too many places you can go in Angle Vale and not bump into someone who raises the Curtis and Heaslip intersection," Mr Burnell said.

"We've been working hard with the State Government over the term to find the solution and through the Housing Support Program... we've been able to allocate \$15 million on a 50/50 contribution basis to deliver this roundabout upgrade.

"It's significant for the area and hopefully is going to reduce the incidents we're seeing at that intersection."

Mr Burnell said community feedback on the announcement has been mostly positive, but constituents still want more work done in the region.

"It's been a journey to get to this point and we've just got to keep raising attention to the needs of the northern suburbs," he said.

"We are the growth corridor for South Australia and I have the expectation that, with that, comes to appropriate level of assistance to deliver the upgrades we need.

"[The State and Federal Governments] will continue to work together on other contributions we can make in a proactive way to ensure our community benefits."

City of Playford Mayor Glenn Docherty welcomed the announcement and said investments like this were vital to managing growth in the northern suburbs.

"Council supports the State and Federal Governments joint funding commitment for the installation of a roundabout at the intersection of Curtis Road and Heaslip Road," Mr Docherty said.

"With an average of 10 people moving to Playford each day, all levels of government have an important role to play in addressing both the challenges and opportunities that come with growth.

"Council will continue to work closely with State and Federal Governments to advocate for upfront and ongoing investment in road, transport, water, and storm water infrastructure to support our expanding city."

SA Minister for Housing and Urban Development Nick Champion said the partnership with his Federal counterparts was an important part of addressing issues in the north.

"The Australian and South Australian Governments are working hard to build more homes faster but we need the supporting infrastructure to keep up with the population growth," he said.

"This upgrade is a priority for us because the intersection already experiences considerable congestion - a problem that is only going to get worse as more people move to the area.

"I want to thank the Australian Government for its help in delivering this project for the people in the northern suburbs."

The design process for the new roundabout is expected to be completed soon, with works to begin in 2025.

"He used to drop in to chat about things other than collecting.

"It was a bit of an escape if you like, drop into the shed and just have a chat about life in general."

Mr Harvey was a wealth of knowledge when it came to collecting.



He had a passion for old architecture and cast iron, Germanic Barossa furniture, as well as his love of toys.

Mr Clarson described him as a "quiet country boy at heart", where he was in the process of moving to Kapunda with his partner Samantha and son Benjamin before the tragedy occurred. "He was such a kind-


hearted person, he really was," Mr Clarson said. "He didn't discriminate with anyone either. He took everyone at face value."

While taken too soon, Mr Clarson remembered him for the genuine person he was.

"What a character, very witty," he said.

Trinity student on the road to lifelong goal

A TRINITY College student has earned a spot in one of the nation's most coveted animal care qualifications following hundreds of hours of work and volunteering.

Trinity Year 12 Ashley Knight is one step closer to realising his childhood dream of becoming a zookeeper after he was accepted into the Taronga Zoo Certificate III in Wildlife and Exhibited Animals course.

The Cert III is one of the most highly sought qualifications for prospective zookeepers in Australia, with Mr Knight excited to get started.

"It was a lot of work to try to get in and I've done a lot of things, like other courses, to boost my chances, so I'm very happy I got in," he said.

"As one of the prerequisites, we needed to do either a minimum of 250 hours in an animal-related field in the 12 months before applying or a Certificate II in Animal Care.

"I had done both. I did my Cert II last year through school and I did over 250 hours by working at a vet clinic, and I do weekly volunteer work at Barossa Wildlife Rescue."

With a lifelong love of zoos, Mr Knight said he has always wanted to be a zookeeper and was champing at the bit to begin his studies. "Since I was a kid,



I've always wanted to be a zookeeper. My parents would bring me to zoos and whenever we went away to other states, we'd go to all the major zoos and explore there," he said.

"There's a little bit of nerves going into it because I don't really know what to expect in terms of difficulty of the course.

"The Cert III is essentially the trade qualification to become a zookeeper.

"Then also it teaches a lot of the basic skills and you do a lot of placements through the course, which will be good to get my name through the zoo network and boost my chances for a job after."

He advised anyone looking at tertiary studies to follow their passions and go for whatever brought them joy.

"Find something that you really enjoy," he said.

"If you don't enjoy your job then it's going to be terrible every time you have to go to work.

"[Zookeeping is] definitely a job that I would truly enjoy going in to work every single day."

Mr Knight's studies will be run through Adelaide Zoo and Monarto.

Parade ready to roll

A JAM-PACKED line-up of festive cheer is ready to return to Gawler with the next edition of the Gawler Christmas Parade.

On Saturday, November 30, thousands are expected to line Murray Street to enjoy the parade's return.

The 2023 parade, which was the first in Gawler for around 40 years, attracted more than 5000 people to Murray Street for a night of festive fun.

Gawler carols back with huge line-up

A GAWLER favourite will return in early December after a last-minute cancellation in 2023.

The 2024 Apex Gawler Community Christmas Carols event is on track to bring a big night of holiday cheer to residents and families all around the region, with a large crowd expected.

Last year's edition of the carols was cancelled due to forecasted storms.

Gawler carols organising committee chair Bronte Rhodes said the crew behind the scenes was "flat chat" to get things ready so the event could make it's long-awaited return.

"We've got the [Apex Christmas markets] going the week before, which is taking up a bit of time at the moment, then the week after we're into the carols," he said.

"The carols last year were cancelled because of inclement weather, so we're hoping the weather gods smile on us this year. "We're hoping and wishing for better

weather." Mr Rhodes said the committee reached three-year funding agreement with major

sponsor Town of Gawler earlier this year, which meant the carols were set to go ahead. With that comes a big line-up of musicians

from across the area. "We like to support the locals from the

schools, Trinity and Xavier," he said. "We've got the Gawler Youth Band there,

we've got Emilie who is the one that was on Australian Idol and is well known in Gawler, and of course we've got Crafty the music man of Gawler."

Adding to the line-up is former Zimbabwe Test cricketer-turned singer Henry Olonga, who Mr Rhodes said jumped at the opportunity to join Gawler's cast at the Hope Cup launch event earlier this year.

"We're expecting 5000 to 6000 people to attend, so come early to get your space. Bring your picnic rug, there will be food vans, the local service clubs will be there in some shape and form cooking up a storm," Mr Rhodes said.

"We've got a dance group on at the start, the Gawler Academy of Dance.

"So we've got a pretty full night."

To cap off the night, Gawler is also expecting a visit from a very jolly man in red who will be fresh off an appearance at the Gawler Christmas Parade a week earlier.

"Santa Claus will be there at 6pm," Mr Rhodes said.

"He'll be introduced on stage, then will move over to his marquees for photos."

Mr Rhodes thanked the many sponsors and volunteers behind the scenes who help make the event possible and encouraged the community to turn out in force to enjoy a night of festivities and fun.

The Gawler Carols will run from 5pm to 9pm at Pioneer Park on December 7.

TOWN of Gawler is aiming to capitalise on the hype of the AFL Gather Round heading to Lyndoch, with event and accommodation opportunities potentially on the cards.

With football fans expected to flock to Lyndoch for the 2025 Gather Round, council wants to see Gawler take advantage of the extra attention in the region.

Town of Gawler Mayor Karen Redman said there is a lot on offer for visitors in the region.

"We have amazing cafés, food, entertainment and hospitality venues, accommodation options to suit every style and budget, plenty of family-friendly parks and playgrounds to experience, diverse retail offerings, and much more," she said.

"Early promotion of what our town offers is key to preparing for Gather Round."

While a lot of promotion and events offerings will be up to individual businesses, Ms Redman said council is working to collaborate with its neighbours on possible tourism experiences during Gather Round.

"We are also liaising with the SA Tourism Commission to ensure that people going to Gather Round can get to Lyndoch via public transport that connects to Gawler's train stations," she said.

"Through Business Gawler,

we are promoting the many opportunities that Gather Round presents to our local businesses, providing them with access to marketing collateral and regional networks.

"We are also encouraging them to be open later, and across the whole weekend, to capitalise on the increased visitation that will be experienced."

However, Ms Redman said there will likely be some challenges to ensuring the Gawler region gets the most out of the expected influx of visitors.

"The largest hurdle envisaged is having enough accommodation and transport options for visitors to stay in Gawler and easily get to Lyndoch

for the games," she said.

"Gawler's caravan parks, hotels and boutique accommodation centres are already experiencing high demand and may be at capacity well in advance of Gather Round.

"We know that there is not enough parking in Lyndoch to cater

for the expected crowds making park and ride and public transport connections to Gawler crucial for the event's success."

Gather Round, to be held from April 10 to 13 in 2025, will see two AFL games played at Barossa Park in Lyndoch.

Fire leads to cannabis crop


A SHED fire has revealed a cannabis crop at Two Wells, with police seizing more than 150 plants.

Hoppo spreads important message in the Barossa

THE Barossa enjoyed a visit from one of the country's most recognised lifeguards on Thursday, November 21, as Bondi Rescue's Bruce 'Hoppo' Hopkins stopped in at The Rex in Tanunda as part of a nation-wide water safety campaign.

Hoppo is an ambassador for Float to Survive, a campaign which aims to teach all Australians how to float and keep themselves safe in the water.

It has now partnered with swim school GOswim, with the campaign coming in response to figures released from the 2024 National Drowning Report, which showed drownings have increased by 16 per cent over the past year compared to the 10-year average.

Hoppo visited Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria and finally South Australia to spread the message.

"We've gone through the different states and just explained the reasons why you need to float and how you'll survive in any waterway, and it's been really well received," Hoppo said.

"It's something that I find, that if you float in any waterway, you're going to be quite safe.

"The endgame is to try and teach as many people as possible... it doesn't matter how old you are, to learn that survival technique is very important."

The Float to Survive teachings include a three-step strategy to lean



your head back, remaining calm with controlled breathing, and then using sculling motions with your arms and legs.

Hoppo said, however, there is no right or wrong way to float, it is just about keeping your head above water.

"It's minimising your energy and keeping your mouth and head above water. If you're not swallowing water you're never going to drown," he said.

"Whichever way you do that, as long as you can keep your head above water and don't get exhausted, that's what we want to try and achieve."

Hoppo said floating could be made more of a focus in early lessons for children, as it can ensure safety in situations where swimmers get caught in rips or currents, whether at the beach or in an inland waterway.

The National Drowning Report showed that 34 per cent of drownings occurred at inland waterway locations, plus another 11 per cent in swimming pools.

The campaign is all about getting people more confident in the water to avoid drowning, and Hoppo said the response from the communities he has visited has been very positive. the water... they don't want their head to go under water, so the floating technique gives you the feel of the water and gives you the confidence in the water without your head going under," he said.

"Once you conquer that, then you can go into doing more freestyle or where you head goes underwater because you've already gained that confidence.

"But if you go straight to freestyle and you start sinking and your head goes under, you get scared, panic and think that's what's going to happen all the time.

"So it's just changing that a little bit to try and get people more confidence in the water."

New book explores pages of the past

A GAWLER-famous cricket batmaker-turned-history-buff has captured the history of Gawler in a new book officially launched last week.

Mr Fielke said both he and the many staff members from the heritage team who helped put the book together are excited to see community members reconnect with the area's history.

"This book records the history of five buildings and the sites, but it has also become a resource for the Gawler Lutheran Church and provides information to the State Heritage team too," he said.

"There's so many possibilities that can come from this book."

Town of Gawler Mayor Karen Redman echoed the comments and shared her thanks to Mr Fielke for capturing a slice of the town's history within the pages.

"It is so important that people like Bob take the time and effort to record our history and create

public publications such as this," she said.

"This book will provide a tangible link that can benefit future generations, [and help] people understand the evolution of the buildings and heritage.


"We live in a world where there is often information overload about current events, however accurate information about the past is harder to find.

Minister for Emergency Services Dan Cregan said turning the app into a multi-hazard platform will provide the community with critical information during emergencies.

"Expanded capabilities and improved user accessibility ensures the community is informed alongside other information sources and channels," he said.

Mixed reaction to proposed code amendment

THE proposed Dublin Code Amendment has received a mixed reaction from residents living in the township and surrounding districts following a community forum over the weekend.

Member for Light Tony Piccolo arranged the forum on Sunday, November 24 to help local residents and landowners gain a better understanding of the proposal and the process that a proponent led code amendment needs to follow.

The proposed Dublin Green Circular Economy Precinct would involve 400 hectares of land south of Dublin rezoned from rural zone to employment type.

Mr Piccolo said he organised the community forum in response to concerns by some residents who did not fully understand the scope of the proposal and what role they play in the process.

The proponents were invited to the forum and explained what the code amendment sought to achieve and what development would be permitted if the land was rezoned.

Mr Piccolo said that attendees



found the forum helpful, "as both the proponents and I explained different aspects of the proposal and process to be followed".

"I ensured that residents and landowners understood their rights under the code amendment process," he said.

"Code amendments can have major impacts – both positive and negative – on local communities, so residents need to fully understand what they are being asked to comment on. "While the proponents have outlined a bold vision for the rezoning, incorporating a range of possible land uses, the proposal which will be considered by the Minister is only the strategic employment zone."

What developments can occur within a strategic employment zone was explained to residents at the forum and a range of questions were asked.

Under the current roles for governing proponent led code

amendments, the Minister for Planning is the final decision maker, but councils have an important role in communicating their communities' views.

Mr Piccolo urged Adelaide Plains Council to defer making a decision at Monday's ordinary meeting until they have had an opportunity to consult directly with residents.

"Given that the consultation process is outsourced to the private proponents, council has to ensure its residents have been given effective opportunities to participate in the process," he said.

"Ultimately, council can make any decision it believes to be in the best interest of their community, but due process must be followed."

There was much discussion about the issue at Monday's meeting, but the majority of councillors agreed there had been enough consultation and moved a motion to instruct the chief executive to make a submission on the code amendment.

A SIX-MONTH nurse exchange initiative enabling metropolitan and rural nurses to deepen their work experience within new settings is already reaping the rewards.

The Metro/Rural Nursing Exchange Program is a unique partnership between Yorke and Northern Local Health Network (YNLHN), Northern Adelaide Local Health Network (NALHN) and Flinders University.

The program invites early career registered nurses to enhance their speciality nursing skills by participating in an exchange.

It is already showing positive signs, with the selected eight nurses happily immersing in their new surroundings and relishing their new workplace opportunities.

Five nurses from YNLHN are gaining experience at the Lyell McEwin Hospital, while two NALHN nurses are at Port Pirie, and another is at Wallaroo.

The program is helping YNLHN and NALHN nurses by providing workplaces to expand their scope of practice and enhance their leadership skills.

Two of those are registered nurses Anna Covino and Louis Pham, who are on exchange in Port Pirie having transferred from the Lyell McEwin Hospital and Modbury Hospital respectively.

Flinders University is conducting an evaluation of this program to assist the state's nursing workforce approach and ensure that opportunities like these deliver positive outcomes for staff and patients.

"At NALHN, we strongly believe collaboration is essential when it comes to growing a skilled and sustainable healthcare workforce," NALHN acting executive director of nursing and midwifery Louise McGuire said.

"Nurses experiencing alternative clinical opportunities will also support communities receiving care closer to home.

"We hope this model can be replicated across the state.

"Not only is it helping to deepen the skills and experience of our nurses, it is also providing them with more job satisfaction by offering new and exciting experiences."

The program is designed for nursing staff already working at either YNLHN or NALHN to commence the six-month placement at any time.

Rotations are available in specialities such as aged care, rehabilitation, palliative care, emergency departments and intensive care, medical, oncology, mental health, surgical, peri-operative, women and children's health, and renal.

"I am enjoying my work and am surrounding myself with a good group of educators who are extremely supportive," Ms Covino said.

"While I am independent, I enjoy that I am being asked if I am doing okay or need a hand."

Funding for the development of the program and the nursing positions has been achieved through a collaborative effort which includes the Chief Nurse and Midwifery Office, SA Health and the two local health networks.

"We are pleased to learn that the nurse exchange is proving to be a huge success for registered nurses in and from YNLHN and NALHN," Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton said.

"This is a fantastic way in which we can support our future workforce and provide nurses with valuable skills and opportunities, both professionally and personally.

"The opportunity to develop nursing skills in different settings with strengthen both our nursing workforce and care for patients."

"Our region has many young, talented artists and artwork enables them to express themselves in a way that sometimes words cannot.



Numeracy checks to be introduced in all schools

MORE than 60 per cent of students were recently found 'mathematically vulnerable', which has prompted the State Government to introduce a numeracy check for all Year 1 students from 2026.

The trial - rolled out for 7000 students across 95 public schools - identified significant numbers of students struggled with place value understanding, and multiplication and division.

Without intervention, the State Government said these students could experience difficulties in progressing through the curriculum.

Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer introduced the trial at the beginning of this year, first in four schools, and then a call-out for other schools that resulted in almost 100 schools taking part in the wider trial.

The numeracy check is a similar concept to the phonics check, introduced by former Education Minister Susan Close in 2017.

The first phonics results in 2018 found, out of almost 6000 students that took part, 58 per cent did not meet the expected achievement.

The introduction of the phonics check has seen literacy improve by 28 percentage points since the first check began.

This year, 71 per cent of Year 1 students met or exceeded expectations, which requires them to correctly decode 28 or more words out of 40.

It is hoped the introduction of the numeracy check will lead to the same positive results for students.


Mr Boyer said results in numeracy were of a concern, particularly from younger students' abilities to grasp certain mathematical concepts.

"When I proposed a numeracy check, similar to the literacy check that former Education Minister Susan Close introduced in 2017 – I was met with resistance," he said.

"Yet, the literacy check led the way across the globe, with other jurisdictions implementing it and seeing improvements in literacy.

"That's exactly what I want to see happen with this numeracy check. It's a way of understanding how students work out mathematical equations, and what might be preventing them from understanding more complex ideas and concepts.

"I'm pleased to see my territory and state colleagues taking notice and expert advice recommending our approach to early intervention strategies."

Informing, Challenging, Conserving



THE Dark Sky Movement is gaining momentum across Australia. This is an international

movement which aims to provide education about the ongoing challenges of artificial light pollution and the effects on wildlife and humanity. Closer to home it was encouraging to

see Carrickalinga become Australia's first International Dark Sky Community. This honour was awarded to the town by Dark Sky International, a United States based not for profit organisation, formed in 1988.

The objectives of the Dark Sky Movement make a lot of sense. The main focus is all about appropriate lighting for our communities. Smart dark sky lighting aims to illuminate the ground and immediate area and not the sky through good design and the use of softer lighting hues. This saves energy and money. It also improves security for footpath and reserve users walking at night.

Traditional LED based "cold white" public space lighting systems tend to blind a pedestrian's or cyclist's vision beyond the immediate area. This situation can reduce the options for choosing the safest walking or cycling path.

The recent release of the State Government's Greater Adelaide Regional Plan (GARP) indicates the focus on urban expansion around Adelaide. This includes current rural land in the Adelaide Hills, Fleurier Peninsula and northern Adelaide Plains. Essential to establish good public lighting policies and standards which will have minimal impact on our wildlife such as microbats, owls and possums and also improve human health and our connection with the incredible light show in the sky.


CITIZEN scientists in Clare and the Barossa Valley pitched in to help track the health of local waterways in October and November.

Local volunteers were involved in the springtime Waterbug Bioblitz events that involved collecting samples from permanent pools and analysing them for macroinvertebrates (water bugs) and water quality data.

This information contributes to the bigger picture of the region's water health and condition and assists with the ongoing management of water resources.

The Clare Valley Waterbug Bioblitz was held on Friday, October 4, 2024, with volunteers helping to collect samples from 10 sites along the Broughton and Wakefield River catchments. While on November 1 samples were collected from 12 sites in the Gawler River catchment. The attendees all received practical training from aquatic ecologists.

Quick, stop the spread of caltrop

MOST people know the pain of stepping on a spiky caltrop prickle. These nasty, "declared" weeds quickly pierce the skin and leave a throbbing toe or foot even after their removal.

It is not a weed that you want to take hold on your property, yet their ability to lodge into shoes, tyres and livestock means they

spread easily. Early summer is the time to keep your eyes peeled for new germinations of caltrop (tribulus terrestris). With each mature caltrop plant producing up to 1000 seeds, pulling them out or using a herbicide before they get a chance to set Caltrop with flowers and mature seed.

seed is the best line of burrs as they move along defence.

For already overrun with caltrop, one option is to use an old piece of carpet or rubber to pick а them up en masse. Roll out the carpet, walk over it and then throw it all out. There are also tow-behind rollers designed to collect caltrop landscape.sa.gov.au/ny

"We are removing unnecessary red tape and increasing transparency to ensure we have an efficient and trusted planning system that can help combat the housing crisis," he said.





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GPs urge government to make healthcare more affordable

THE government is being urged to do more to make essential GP care affordable, after a national survey showed more people are delaying care they need due to financial concerns amid the cost-of-living crisis.

Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) data released on Monday, November 18, revealed the proportion of patients citing cost as a reason they have delayed or avoided seeing their GP has increased from seven to 8.8 per cent.

It also confirmed that females, younger people, lower income people and patients with long-term health conditions were more likely to delay or not use health services when needed due to cost.

Royal Australian College of GPs president Nicole Higgins said "funding gets results".

"GPs have been able to bulk bill more children, pensioners, and healthcare card holders since the tripling of bulk billing incentives," she said.

"But more is needed to ensure everyone in Australia can get the care they need, and with the cost-of-living crisis, too many people are delaying essential care."

Dr Higgins said the ABS data shows that more people are delaying health care simply because they can not afford it. "We know that when people put off care, they get sicker and it puts more strain on our hospitals and the whole health system," she said.

"We're also seeing young people starting to treat preventative care as optional, because it's a cost they can't afford, which is concerning."

The survey showed that 15.4 per cent of people aged from 25 to 34-years-old delayed GP care due to cost in 2023-24, up from 10.2 per cent in the previous year.

"Preventive care is essential at all ages – it is how we catch disease early, get on top of health issues, and help people live healthier and longer lives," Dr Higgins said.

"We're calling on the government to do more to make general practice care accessible and affordable for everyone, including by increasing patients' Medicare rebates for longer consults.

"There is no substitute for the care you get from a GP who knows you and your history.

"More investment in general practice will help to ensure that people at every income level stay healthy and out of hospital."

"We're urging all players who


purchased a Set for Life ticket from Northern News to check their tickets today," she said.

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








Growing old together is not going to happen as we thought it would

DEMENTIA AUSTRALIA

LIVING with dementia can bring about various emotions, including grief.

But it is not just grieving about what was, it can also be grief about what the future will bring.

The dreams that Jonathan and his wife Sophie shared about their future have dramatically changed since he was diagnosed with younger onset frontotemporal dementia last year.

"We've always talked about growing old together and I now know that it's not going to happen the way we thought it would," Sophie said.

Instead, Sophie is now focused on keeping Jonathan living well in the present and the time to come.

"He's got the right to have a fulfilling life," Sophie said.

"As his family, we have to make adjustments to ensure he can still be independent, be respected, have friendships."

While Sophie understands that the future looks different, it is not always easy to cope when someone you love experiences these changes, which is why the couple reached out to the National Dementia Helpline after Jonathan's diagnosis.

"I was directed to online events and I found webinars," Sophie said.

"I also started downloading books and the Dementia Australia website has got a whole lot of facts sheets about mild cognitive impairment, so I just literally read everything I possibly could.

"It didn't stop me crying but it helped me understand how I could be better at coping."

Grief when things change

Grief can also arise when loved ones living with dementia express themselves in different ways or through thought patterns than they've previously had.

Sophie used a recent incident of attending a medical appointment as an example.

"Jonathan just got out of the car, crossed the road and kept walking," Sophie said. "Never in 30 years has he ever left me to walk by myself."

But it is not just carers or loved ones who experience grief.

Noticing these changes in yourself can also trigger these feelings.

Jonathan says he has come to terms with various changes including only being able to follow one topic and conversation at a time.

"Even if I was sitting there having a conversation with one person and there were another two people next to me having another conversation, I couldn't follow," Jonathan said.

Ambiguous Grief

National Dementia Helpline advisor Andrea explains that grief can start much sooner than people expect.

"Often it's thought that grief happens at the end of life for someone, but what we know and hear is that the grieving period can start from the point of diagnosis," Andrea said.

"It's a term called ambiguous loss because your loved one is still here but there are losses that are related to the diagnosis and the condition."

Those losses can come in the form of many life aspects and uncertainty about what living with dementia means going forward.

"Changes in their relationship, losses around the future and future plans they once had," Andrea said.

"For someone experiencing that, it's hard to share those losses because they aren't obvious to anyone else nor is the anticipation of further losses along the way."

Jonathan is grateful his family has support and services from Dementia Australia that they can access when they are struggling.

"The knowledge that Dementia Australia is supporting them is fantastic and having the services that they have, has just made every difference," Jonathan said.

funds Home Care Packages to help eligible older Australians access home care services.

Home Care Packages pay for comprehensive home care services across four levels - covering everything from basic household services to higher level nursing and medical support.

Each Home Care Package level provides a set amount of money, allocated as an annual budget.

Home Care Package providers use this money, on an individual's behalf, to organise services to help them live comfortably and independently at home.

What can Home Care Package funds be used for?

Depending on the Home Care

Package level you are assigned, services may include:

- medical care personal care and grooming
- home administration
- chores and housekeeping
- garden maintenance
- home maintenance •
- shopping and meal preparation · home delivered meals
- travel support
- goods, equipment, and assistive technology
- mobility aids
- home modifications
- allied health services
- dementia care
- · social support and companionship.

What will you have to pay? The fees you will need to pay will depend on your care needs, your financial situation, which level Home Care Package level you are allocated and which Home Care Package provider you choose to

manage the services you receive. Home Care Package fees can include:

A basic daily fee: everyone who receives a Home Care Package must pay this set fee, which ranges from \$11.72 to \$13.08 depending on vour package level.

An income tested fee: an income and assets assessment conducted by Services Australia/



Centrelink will determine whether you need to pay this fee, which can be up to \$37.55 per day.

Service and management fees: these are taken out of your package and vary depending on providers. Additional service fees: your

Home Care Package provider may charge additional fees that they must disclose to you as part of their fee breakdown.

Modify your house to suit your needs

AS you get older, living independently in your own home can become more difficult. If you are finding it harder to do the things

you used to, you can ask for some help at home.

While accessing support with food preparation, house cleaning, and personal care is well known, accessing governmentfunded house modifications is not.

Home modification providers are available to make houses safer and more age-friendly, extending the time that older people can remain in their own home.

These may be small modifications, such as installing levered handles on doors, easyaccess taps, bath rails or shower hoses, or larger ones, such as installing a bathroom or kitchen on the ground floor or modifying the stairs.

Carers also appreciate modifications that reduce risk and danger and make their work easier. Examples include installing a ramp entrance to the home of someone living in a wheelchair or grab rails in the bathroom to help someone get in and out of the bath.

You can apply for a home modifications subsidy through the My Aged Care online portal.

There are two options:

- The Commonwealth Home Support Programme gives entry-level home help to seniors to support them to stay free, and independent. Subsidised home modifications services include installation of safety alerts or alarms, inclines, and handrails.
- · Home Care Packages, for seniors with

more complex care demands, provide a range of subsidised home modifications as a component of support services.

Where to get advice

The Home Modification Information Clearinghouse (HMinfo) is a Commonwealth Government-funded information service that offers advice about home modifications for older people and people with disability. HMinfo researches and disseminates

home modification information to the public as well as industry, care workers, and even academics.

Some of their latest consumer factsheets provide information about:

- Staying safe during a floodHome automations for older people and
- people with disability
- Escaping a fire
- Home safety resources for older peopleArranging home modifications.


Arranging home modifications

If you want to know more about what home modifications are available, you can contact HMinfo on 1800 305 486 or visit www.homemods.info

An initial step could be consulting an occupational therapist (OT) who can help identify areas of the home that need modifying.

OTs are health professionals who work with you to assess your support needs. Ask your GP about making an appointment with an OT or visit OT Australia or ring 1300 682878.

Modification factors to consider Adaptability: some modifications can be



made quickly to meet your demands without having to redesign your home.

These include fitting grab-rails on bathroom walls and flexible cases under the sink so that someone in a wheelchair can utilise the areas.

Accessibility: improve accessibility by making doorways broader, for wheelchairs, reduce kitchen cupboards heights for sinks and cabinets, and fixing grab-rails and ramps.



BAROSSA District Football Club kick-started its preseason on Thursday night for their newly re-formed senior women's team, and the Bulldogs are buzzing to be back competing for the BLGW crown.

The club is no stranger to success in the senior women's ranks, finishing top-four and playing in a preliminary final in each of the 2021 (7-4-1 record), 2022 (7-5) and 2023 (10-2) seasons.

Notably, however, was that Angaston failed to field a senior side in both 2022 and 2023, resulting in a significant portion of the team hopping over to Williamstown to pull on a Bulldogs guernsey.

When Angaston re-entered the mix this year, it caused a mini-exodus of returning Panthers leaving the Bulldogs, meaning that for the first time since the BLGW's formation Barossa District would not be represented in the top grade.

Fortunately it was only a one-year hiatus, with the club announcing in October that new co-senior women's coaches Dean Woods and Greg Dempsey have been brought in to get things back on track.

Dempsey was an experienced SANFL midfielder in the late 1990s and had a cup of coffee in the AFL system, originally training with the inaugural Port Adelaide AFL squad before eventually returning to the local ranks where he won premierships at Salisbury West and North Haven.

Woods also comes from North Haven, where he played over 500 senior games for the club and was a part of three premierships. He followed his playing career with more than a decade of coaching, including four years as a senior women's coach.

Barossa District's women's football coordinator Kristen Amber took the time to speak with *The Bunyip* about the excitement and challenges that come with getting a senior team off the ground.

"The club had been in discussion with Greg and Dean for several months, with a view of them both working together to create a new and exciting football program at the Barossa District Football Club," she said. www.bunyippress.com.au "We believe with the extensive experience Greg and Dean have gained from both playing and coaching, they will be invaluable to our club.

"They will create an environment where there is a heavy focus on football fundamentals, teamwork, love of the game and respect towards opposition players, umpires and team mates.

"It is extremely difficult rebuilding a side from scratch. Having said that, the response that we received from our first announcement was wonderful and we are very optimistic that more people will want to join us going forward as we start our 2025 season."

The recruits have already begun to flow as excitement builds about the Bulldogs' return and the club's impending move to the newly renovated facility in Lyndoch that will play host for the AFL's Gather Round.

"We have been fortunate enough to secure a number of recruits and returning players for next season," Amber said.

"With the signing of these players, it brings plenty of excitement to our club, which we believe through social media and word of mouth will promote a fun and exciting opportunity and environment for more players to come and join the Bulldog family in the coming months."

One of those returning former players is local media personality Bailee Major, who said she could not miss the opportunity to have another crack with her favourite club.

"I've been involved since the beginning of the women's league in 2018, generally in a more off-field role, but whether it was playing or on the sidelines, I just love being around it," she said.

"I've been hosting the BLGW show for the last few seasons, doing the weekly wrap ups with KOTN Media, supporting all the teams and the whole league, but I've always hinted I'd love to be back in a playing position, and opportunity has risen this season to do so, so I'm back on.

"Honestly I never doubted we'd have a team again this year. Unfortunately last year we couldn't fill the senior side, but we have a lot of our under 16s ready to come into the senior team and we've had a lot of previous

players coming back too.



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Ward and Foran reach triple-figures

ROUND 4 of the Para District Cricket Association Grade 1 season got underway on Saturday with a fresh slate of two-day fixtures, and stealing the show was Salisbury West's David Ward with a big century.

Ward came in at number five for Salisbury West away from home at Craigmore and piled up 142 runs from 150 deliveries, hitting 16 fours and one ball over the rope.

It was easily a season-high for the club's captain after contributing 21 runs in Round 1, and after missing Round 2 he returned with a nine-ball duck in Round 3.

This time around everything was clicking, and he had plenty of support as Cooper McInnes (63 not-out from 100 balls), Jake Sewell (41 from 50), Anthony Lewendon (29 from 32) and Lyndon Woods (28 from 53) helped Salisbury West post a score of 7/363 from the full 70 overs.

It was the second-biggest total of the Grade 1 season so far. The other two (9/394 and 9/378) both came from Adelaide Hazara.

In fact this was the first week that Adelaide Hazara has scored below 300, running into a great bowling performance as the Eyre Royals bowled them out for 172 in 48 overs.

Russell Figallo spearheaded the attack with 5/42 from 17 overs and the pair of Cameron Mansueto (2/40 from 14 overs) and Tobin

Taylor (1/35 from 10 overs) also played important roles.

The Royals had 22 overs to navigate before stumps and they were in no hurry, slowly making their way to 2/31 when time was called after both openers fell.

That is set up as perhaps the only competitive fixture for this Saturday's second day, with both Angle Vale and Virginia dominating their respective proceedings.

For Angle Vale, some well-rounded batting efforts from James Kelly (80 from 156 deliveries), Jack Pessano (75 from 52 balls), Jamie Quirk (71 from 108), Ashley Fry (40 from 33) and Corey Dent (26 not-out from 23) built a hefty total of 7/327 for North Pines to chase.

So far this season North Pines' top score was 9/217 in a gutsy Round 2 win, successfully tracking down Criagmore's 215.

Capping this week's Grade 1 action was a rapid first-innings victory from Virginia, who bowled out ATCO for 86 and then used the 26 overs of daylight to race to 2/109.

Nathan Warren (4/27 from 16 overs) and Anthony Bascombe (3/8 from 5.1 overs) were Virginia's standouts with ball in-hand, and although Bascombe was run-out for a duck, the trio of Alex Leo (48 runs), Nick O'Reilly (28 not-out) and John Natsias (24 not-out) put their side in position for an outright result. Meanwhile, there were one-day matchups on the Grade 2 schedule and improving their unbeaten record to 4-0 was Salisbury West, who hammered Eyre Royals by 142 runs.

Three half-centuries from Austen Perris (59), Andrew Parkhouse (58) and Mike Innes (53) justified Salisbury West's decision to bat first, reaching 6/250 from the 40 overs.

Nathan Haythorpe (37 not-out) and Kym Morriss (24) tried to keep the Royals competitive, but the smothering bowling stocks of Riley Cowen (3/13 from eight overs) and Justin Benton (3/34 from eight overs) helped hold the chasing side to 9/108 - a run-rate of 2.7 per over.

It is all Salisbury at the top of the table as Salisbury North ran away with a seven-wicket win over Angle Vale to reach 3-1.

Matthew Bennetts (4/32 from eight overs) headlined the Salisbury North bowlers, keeping Angle Vale to just 119 when they were bowled out in the 28th over, and then it was Jason Collard (50 not-out) who led the batters past the target in the 27th over for an early finish.

But Grade 2's best individual outing came from Craigmore's Daniel Foran, connecting with 19 boundaries (one six) on his way to a division-high 119 from 103 balls against Smithfield.

Foran ended up outscoring Smithfield's

whole team, which was cleaned up for 111 thanks in large part to the efforts of Jonathan Morton (4/5 from four overs) and Scott Dawson (3/24 from 4.4 overs).

HOBBY trainer Ross Collins believes he picked up a bargain in promising two-year-old filly Jawsofgoodtime, who was an impressive winner at Globe Derby Park on Saturday

Contesting heat one of the 2024 Cobbity Equine Farm Southern Cross Series for two-year-old fillies (1800m), Jawsofgoodtime (\$2.50 favourite), driven by Corey Johnson, led throughout to score a seven-metre win from Torque Intheusa (\$4.60), with another 15-metre gap to Kittycat Cutie (\$3.40) in third.

Johnson dictated the tempo with a pedestrian 65-second first half of the last 1600 metres before dashing home in 57.2 seconds.

Collins, who trains at Mallala, purchased the filly from the Lamond family in the South-East for \$3500.

"With a win in Mildura and now tonight she has picked up \$17,000 in bonuses as well as \$10,000 in stakes, so it has been a great buy," Collins said.

"I'm sure she will be even better with a bit of age because she is still a big baby.

"If there is a minor injury to be picked up, she will find it, but thanks to Corey (Johnson) her race manners are improving with every run."

Collins is looking forward to Jawsofgoodtime competing in the \$35,000 Cobbity Equine Farm Southern Cross Final (1800m) on Saturday at Globe Derby Park, but will find Brighton, the winner of the second heat, a massive rival.

Owned and bred by former Harness Racing South Australia chief executive Mark Carey, Brighton was devastating in taking out her heat.

Trained in Victoria by Emma

Stewart, and driven by Gaita Pullicino, Brighton (\$1.10 favourite) led throughout from gate five and raced away to win by 25 metres, rating a sizzling 1:54.4.

Machete Roulette (\$7) chased the winner throughout and held on for second, six metres in front of Jades Hope (\$21).

Brighton, although yet to win before Saturday, had been racing against the best of her sex in Victoria and appreciated the chance to run in the Southern Cross.

The barrier draw will be crucial for the 2024 Alabar Three-Year-Old Colts & Geldings Southern Cross Series Final (2230m) following two outstanding heats on Saturday.

Hezrockinroyalty (\$2.90) made effective use of gate two to find the lead in the first heat and prove too good for Bay Jim Major (\$1.33 favourite), which raced outside him but had to be content with second, beaten three metres.


The winner is part-owned and trained at Murray Bridge by Alan Cronin, who wore his "lucky" green Irish socks on Saturday, and no doubt will have them on again this week.

Cronin and his wife Ngareta had a European vacation earlier this year and made a good friendship in Ireland with Derek Delaney, who runs the standard-bred Oakwood Stud in County Offaly with his brother James.

The Delaneys have also created the Vincent Delaney Memorial in honour of their brother who passed away from cancer at a young age. The VDM weekend is growing each year and attracts visitors from around the world.

"I'm sure Derek will have watched Hezrockinroyalty's win, we stay in regular communication," Cronin said.

"A while ago we were having



trouble getting him to race truly, but a number of gear changes and putting Ryan (Hryhorec) in the sulky has helped turn it all around.

"He is coming good at the right time and I'm sure with a favourable draw he will be competitive in the final."

Bay Jim Major, trained by Les Harding and driven by Danielle Hill, lost no admirers with his second and he will be a major factor this Saturday in the \$35,000 final.

Victorian trainer Emma Stewart and driver Gaita Pullicino brought up a double when No Notthebuttons led throughout in heat two.

An unbackable \$1.10 favourite, No Notthebuttons, part-owned by Aaron Bain Racing and a number of its major clients, rated 1:56.9 in beating Tonkawaikon (\$7), which chased him throughout, by eight metres.

Pullicino rated the winner perfectly, increasing the tempo with each quarter and a final 400 metres in 27.9 seconds made it near impossible to be run down.

The \$35,000 Cobbity Equine

Farm Two-Year-Old Colts & Geldings (1800m) Southern Cross Series final also looks to be an interesting clash.

Splash Of Paynt (\$2.90 into \$1.65 favourite) led throughout from gate one in his heat, driven by Danielle Hill, and rating an impressive 1:56.2.

Having just his second start for trainer Ray Holberton, the gelding won comfortably by seven metres from Stormy Woods (\$2.90), trained in Mount Gambier by Steven Fennell.

While Splash Of Paynt was impressive, so too was the second heat winner Always Dancing, trained by Alyce Finnis in Mount Gambier, and driven by her husband Jayson.

Always Dancing (\$1.40 favourite) was driven up to lead but was tackled strongly from the 500-metre mark by Victorian-trained Zenario (\$3), and the pair looked set for a stirring battle.

But in the home straight, the winner raced away to score by eight metres from Art Regal (\$21), which grabbed second a half-metre ahead

The heats were the appetisers on Saturday, and this Saturday at Globe Derby Park will be the main meal with all the Southern Cross Series finals.

Stumpy's short shots

BACK in February I warned evervone that Yashasvi Jaiswal was coming, and he well and truly announced his arrival in the first Test of the highly anticipated Border-Gavaskar Trophy series between Australia and India.

For those who do not recall, I wrote: "You may not have heard of Yashasvi Jaiswal yet, but as sure as the sun will rise tomorrow, you certainly will shortly, and certainly throughout India's upcoming five-match Test tour of Australia at the end of 2024".

Jaiswal, 22, is India's new left-handed opening batting superstar.

He very well could join the list of Indian champion batsmen, such as Sunil Gavaskar, Virat Kohli, and Sachin Tendulkar'.

A southpaw opener, Jaiswal gained particular attention when he scored double-centuries in two consecutive Test matches against England in a five-match Test series earlier this year.

Tremble in fear because Jaiswal has arrived

He is the third Indian batter to achieve the feat after Vinod Kambli and Virat Kohli.

Yashasvi is the third-youngest cricketer in Test history to have two double-centuries, after Sir Don Bradman and Vinod Kambli.

In the same series, he equalled the world record held by Wasim Akram for the most number of sixes (12) scored by a cricketer in a Test innings.

He became only the second Indian after Sunil Gavaskar to score 700 runs in a Test series.

Following his eight-ball duck in his first innings in the First Test in Perth, Yashasvi stamped his class on the series with a classy 161 in the second.

Jaiswal made his first-class debut for Mumbai on January 7, 2019. In June 2023 he was selected in the first Test match in the series against the West Indies, scoring a awarded the 'Player of the Match'. Simply put, the kid can play.

England's head coach Brendon McCullum said it all: "He's quite a talent. The innings he played (against us) were superb".

Dare I say, a number of the Australian top-order batters should take some batting lessons from the opportunity of watching Yashasvi from close-up.

What he possesses, which comparatively is non-existent with the likes of Marnus Labuschagne and Travis Head, is the essential fundamental of good batting - footwork.

The basic principle in batting, similar to building a house, is that you start at the bottom, and put down the foundations first, not the roof.

When batting, if you get the feet right there is a chance that you will get the rest of the process correct. If the footwork is poor or non-existent, it's only a matter of time before things go wrong.

Yashasvi's second-innings century - brought up with an amazingly controlled ramp shot for six down to fine-leg - was perfectly illustrative of his abilities.

It is scary to think what come from his bat in the following four Tests. Jaiswal is 22, not 32. It's mind-blowing to think what he may well be in ten years.

Back here in Australia, we have no one within the length of Flemington straight to compare with him.

The scribes keep talking of NSW's Sam Konstas; but comparatively, he's not in the same league

Even more frightening from Australia's point of view is that India has a queue of talented young batters and bowlers lining up to gain a place in their national team.

Reality says that India could pick another Test team capable of beating Australia.

So much for the pre-Test series predictions from press scribes such as Daniel Cherny (Australia 4-1), Robert Craddock (Australia 3-1) and Ben Horne (Australia 3-1)!

Based upon what?

Having finished off Gawler Central in just 33 overs, South Gawler had the opportunity to face 29 overs before stumps.

It was a horror start to the chase, losing both openers for ducks, but the three-four partnership of Riley Barker (60 from 77 balls) and Chris Graser (77 from 70 deliveries) surpassed the target by themselves.

Overall South raced to 6/184 before time was called, putting them in perfect position to pile on a few more before sending the visitors back in for a second innings.

FOR the second week in a row Willaston's Dallas Riches earned top billing in Barossa and Light Cricket Association's junior ranks, following his half-century on day one with a stellar bowling performance on the second day of his two-day battle against Gawler Central.

Playing at Gawler Central, Riches topscored with 57 runs from 50 deliveries on November 15 to help Willaston set a target of 179 for the home side to chase down.



The other A2 clash between Light Pass and Lyndoch was just as action-packed, except in this one the Dockers were able to claim a first-innings result before the end of play.



Wendt and Reed lead Lions' Div 1 wins



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



Do science with adults

INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup of used coffee grounds
- 1/2 cup of cold coffee
- 1 cup of flour
- 1/2 cup of salt
- Baking paper
- objects for impressions
- Cookie cutter

METHOD

- 1. Brew ½ cup of coffee and save the grounds. Allow time for the coffee to cool.
- 2. Mix the coffee grounds, coffee, flour, and salt into a dough. Knead, then flatten it on baking paper.
- 3. Cut out shapes with cookie cutters and press small objects into the dough to make imprints. Remove the objects to reveal the "fossils."
- 4. (Optional) Poke a hole near the edge if you want to hang it later.
- 5. Let the fossils dry overnight. (depending on how thick you make them, it could take longer).




