The 'Yip changes hands

THE Bunyip owner Ben Taylor announced last week that he has sold the historic Gawler newspaper to *SA Today*, the publishers of *The Plains Producer* and a number of other regional newspapers across South Australia.

SA Today will be only the third owner of *The Bunyip* after William Barnet, who in-part established the newspaper back in 1863.

The Barnet family then sold *The Bunyip* to the Taylor family in 2003 and now *SA Today* becomes the new custodian.

The sale, set to be finalised on December 2, marks the next chapter for the paper.

SA Today's acquisition of The Bunyip brings its portfolio to 18 weekly newspaper mastheads, underscoring the company's commitment to supporting independent, local journalism in communities throughout South Australia and the Northern Territory. SA Today group general manager Renee Bennett expressed her enthusiasm for the

acquisition.

"The Bunyip holds a special place in the heart of Gawler and the surrounding region, and we are dedicated to preserving its legacy as a trusted voice for the community," she said.

"We look forward to working with the people of Gawler to ensure *The Bunyip* continues to thrive as a true community asset.

"This acquisition reflects our commitment to regional communities and the vital role that newspapers like *The Bunyip* play in keeping locals informed, engaged, and connected.

"We are honoured to be the custodians of this important publication."

Mr Taylor, who has owned *The Bunyip* since 2003, shared his confidence in *SA Today's* stewardship.

"The Bunyip has been an integral part of the Gawler community for generations, and it has been a privilege to uphold its tradition," he said.

"I am confident that under *SA Today*, the newspaper will continue to flourish and serve the community."

The Bunyip general manager Tony Swan also welcomed the acquisition.

"Our team is excited about joining *SA Today*, and we are grateful to Ben for his leadership over the years, which has allowed us to build on the legacy of the Barnet family in continuing to grow this important publication for the region," he said.

"We look forward to building on this foundation with the support of *SA Today*."

With *The Bunyip* and *The Plains Producer* in its portfolio, *SA Today* is positioned to uphold the future of regional journalism in South Australia, ensuring that publications like *The Bunyip* continue to deliver trusted, high-quality news to the unique communities they serve.

The \$5 million development being built on Two Wells Road in Willaston will aim to improve response times to emergency incidents while also taking pressure off neighbouring units in Salisbury and Kapunda.

Mr Beattie and Mr Cregan gave particular credit to Mr Piccolo, who has long been an advocate for an SES unit in Gawler.

Mr Cregan said the growth being seen in the north requires this investment.

"Chris [Beattie] has advised me that there are more than 30 volunteers who already have their uniforms who are committed to ensuring... that they're available to serve their community with skill and expertise and we're particularly thankful," he said.

"We want to ensure that we have facilities that are fit for purchase to that end and in consequence of that objective and the government's commitment to deliver this project at this site."

The Gawler unit has attracted strong community interest, thanks to two wellattended recruitment information sessions held in September.

It is the first brand-new SES unit in around 25 years.

It will feature an operations room, which can function as an incident control centre, three offices, a communications room, kitchen and welfare facilities.

An appliance building will include two

engine bays, storeroom, change rooms, accessible bathroom and a laundry area.

The site will also have outdoor sandbagging distribution, training and emergency staging areas, with off-street parking for SES personnel, visitors and disability spaces.

"The new dedicated unit will encourage more local men and women to volunteer for this important service," Mr Piccolo said.

"Having the SES locally based will deliver better response times and help keep our community safe.

"Establishing this unit is another election commitment the State Labor Malinauskas Government is delivering."

The Gawler unit will help ease pressure on the Salisbury and Kapunda units, which have responded to more than a combined 7000 callouts throughout the past decade.

"The Gawler area has previously been admirably serviced by the Kapunda and Salisbury SES units," Mr Beattie said.

"However, with Gawler identified as a high growth area over the coming years, the need for a new unit in Gawler became very clear.

"We have had terrific interest and support from the Gawler community to join the new unit and we look forward to working with the local community going forward."

Construction is anticipated to be completed in mid-2025.



BUILDING Australia's space sector and encouraging more diversity in STEM are two of the driving passions behind a Cockatoo Valley engineer's nomination for the state's Australian of the Year Awards.

Sarah Cannard has blazed a trail for women in STEM across her career as an aerospace engineer, with her growing list of accolades now including a nomination for the SA Australian of the Year award.

Dr Cannard's resumé includes involvement in hypersonic rocket launches, the design of Australia's first lunar rover and the Hunter Class Frigate Program.

Through it all, Dr Cannard has made time to actively encourage people from all walks of life to follow their passions in STEM and engineering while helping to build Australia's space industry.

She described her nomination as a surprise and said she was both honoured and humbled.

"It was very unexpected and it's nice to know that someone out there is recognising what you do for the community," she said.

"There's also a feeling of embarrassment, I suppose, with regards to there's lots of people out there I that I think do tremendous work for women in STEM and STEM in general.

"Nonetheless, very humbled and proud to receive a nomination."

While the nomination was welcome recognition, Dr Cannard said there was still lots more to do in bringing diversity to engineering.

"It's a bit of a double-edged sword that we're still, 20 years on after I graduated, very far from having parity in engineering," she said.

"That large amount of diversity across the engineering field is still something that we're working towards.

"It saddens me that we still haven't quite made inroads there, and that's driving a lot of my passion for this."

Alongside that passion is her drive to bring more people into Australia's budding space sector, which Dr Cannard said will only continue to grow and provide jobs for people closer to home.

"I've absolutely loved being an engineer, working in the space sector, being a female in this sector in Australia and I want to be able to communicate that to others so they feel like they have a place in this sector," she said.

"I remember when I was at uni, finished my degree, got a job with the local South Australian engineering company Nova Systems, and I always had it in the back of my mind if I really want to work in the space sector I better go work for a real space company overseas.

"Especially as a female, if you want to have a family and settle down a little bit, those sorts of conflicting requirements of wanting to be close to family but also head overseas to pursue your dreams, they can be at odds with each other.

"To be able to be part of projects or lobby and promote particularly space as a career in Australia means that you no longer have to make those choices."

Dr Cannard said regardless of the nomination's outcome, she wanted to use the opportunity to continue showcasing her love of engineering for the next generations.

"Australia is on the cusp of really proving its worth to the international space sector. We've got a lot to offer in Australia," she said.

"We do world-class research, we've got

world-class ingenuity and engineering and technology.

"Being an engineer in the space sector is just so amazing – just pursue it, don't let anyone tell you otherwise."

AN ANDREWS Farm foster carer is hoping to leverage her time in the spotlight to help enact meaningful change for vulnerable children as part of the SA Australian of the Year awards.

The Carer Project co-founder and foster carer Lisa O'Malley was recently announced as one of four nominees for the Local Hero for South Australia Award.

Ms O'Malley has seen more than 200 foster placements come through her home, with children coming through multiple times. She said she was not expecting to get the nomination at all.

"Getting the call was a bit of a surprise, a bit overwhelming, because I don't like being in the spotlight," she said.

"At the same time, I appreciate being acknowledged and that carers, or whoever has nominated me, have seen the benefits of what we're all doing."

While winning the award would be an honour, Ms O'Malley said she hopes her time in the public eye can be a good chance to continue her fierce advocacy for children and carers.

"I'm hoping that it in some way enables me to be able to keep contributing and to get a seat at the table where I'm actually heard and my experience and knowledge is taken on board and we can work towards making the right changes," she said.

"And especially getting better outcomes for our kids because they only get one childhood.

"I'm hoping it opens some doors where people are willing to sit down and really listen to hopefully make those changes."

Ms O'Malley said there needed to be more investment into foster care to ensure more children have access to loving and stable homes during tumultuous and traumatic points of their lives.

"Firstly, the need for more foster carers so that all children have the opportunity to grow up in loving family-based homes," she said.

"There are too many children in residential care so retaining foster carers should be a number one priority.

"That also means there needs to be an improvement in the supports for foster and kinship carers."

She said it was not always easy to get access to decision makers who could help make those changes.

Most importantly, though, Ms O'Malley said she would continue to be a staunch advocate for children regardless of the nomination.

"We have vulnerable children coming into our homes who often will have trauma histories of some kind - they're not in our homes because nothing happened to them," she said.

"They can often be targeted as well as they're growing up, so we need to lead by example to show them how we treat other people, how we respect other people, and we need to be the biggest advocate.

"They need to know that we're on their team... so they know they do have people surrounding them who do care."

Further growth identified in Plains GARP response



CONSIDERATION of further locations for increased residential and employment land supply, plus the opening up of further development potential through Gawler River flood infrastructure investment are among Adelaide Plains Council's Greater Adelaide Regional Plan (GARP) submission which was endorsed at the ordinary meeting on October 28.

The submission states council is open to further growth but reinforces key challenges including lack of potable water, lack of sewer infrastructure, no

planning for public transport services and the lack of new development leading to local housing diversity, including aged housing.

Council is open to all land flagged by the GARP for growth, including north of Two Wells for a residential future, and land for employment growth at Two Wells and west of Dublin.

"In advising of openness, council recognises all land flagged for growth, be it residential employment, needs investigating, or infrastructure planning, engagement and rezoning, and a wide variety of State Government as well as council decisions over numerous years," the submission states.

Council has identified additional locations for further residential and employment growth,

including the Leinad Land Developments south of Dublin, land west of Port Wakefield Highway near Two Wells, and north and east of the Mallala township.

The GARP states that any further growth areas and development needs to consider the flood prone nature of Gawler River, and subsequent infrastructure investment that may be required.

Council's submission states that work is ongoing to develop a business case to raise the height of the Bruce Eastick Dam wall, which would reduce flood risk.

"GARP should include the opening up of development potential to the east of Two Wells and in Lewiston through flood infrastructure investment as an area of investigation to be undertaken," it states

100 YEARS AGO

THE PREMIER OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA AT GAWLER... The Premier of South Australia, Hon. J. Gunn, in his visit to Gawler... had a capital reception in the Gawler Institute Hall. Mr Gunn really came in the interests of the Labor effort to capture the seat made vacant in the Barossa, nevertheless he gave much knowledge of local interest, and was loudly applauded for his principles and determination. Mr Gunn dealt at some length on the previous Government's administration particularly in reference to the state railways locomotive requirements, and definitely answered in the negative, the hope that the contract let overseas might be cancelled and the work reviewed to meet local industrial demands.

50 YEARS AGO

RATES RISE BY UP TO 500 PER CENT... A number of ratepayers are incensed by an increase in Gawler Town Council rates of up to 500 per cent this year. Hardest hits were residents and business proprietors in streets close to the main shopping centre and Gawler east, where land values have risen sharply. Mr. D. H. Anders, who lives with his family in a large house on the corner of Calton Road, said he would have to pay out \$900 in council rates this year - \$725 more than last financial year.

25 YEARS AGO

NO, NO CRY VOTERS... Wakefield electorate delivered resounding NO votes to both the preamble and republic questions in Saturday's referendum. On the question of the republic the overall percentage vote in favour of the NO vote was 67.15, but this varied from as high as 83.91 at Arthurton down to 47.32 at Forreston – the only polling place which recorded a majority for the YES case.

RESIDENTS SAY 'SLOW DOWN' ... Playford Council is calling on the Department of Planning, Transport and Infrastructure to review the speed limit and signage on the notorious Gawler-One Tree Hill Road. Elected members moved a motion last Tuesday to lobby DPTI to reassess the safety of the 100km/h road following concerns expressed by Yattalunga resident Sandy Davies. Farmer suicide rates are double those of other workers, yet farmers are far less likely to seek help.

Why? Because of a deep-seated stigma and the independent spirit that runs through rural life.

Our farmers are not just enduring "one bad season", as some out-of-touch remarks suggest.

They are dealing with rising costs – fuel, feed, insurance – unique to farming, which make every drought or failed crop a potential disaster.

The public's misconceptions are far removed from the reality of farming life, and our policymakers need to understand the severity of these struggles.

Recent stressors, including a live sheep export ban and severe frost in the vineyards, further compound the daily challenges faced by our rural communities.

Efforts by groups like Beyond Blue, R U OK?, and ifarmwell to support our farmers are vital, but this is not enough.

We need government policies that genuinely address the unique needs of our farmers.

They aren't asking for special treatment just a fair go.

I will be advocating for our state parliament to take this issue seriously and hope to see an inquiry begun soon.

Farmers are the backbone of our economy. If we truly value them, we must act now to support their mental well-being.

YEAR 12 students across the north have been preparing to sit their South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) exams this week.

The exams – paper, electronic and oral, will deliver final assessments for more than 12,500 secondary students enrolled in examined subjects as part of their SACE) qualification.

With the exam season being a source of anxiety for many students across Gawler and surrounding regions, Trinity College teachers have shared some helpful advice on how to reduce stress.

encouraged students to be kind to themselves over the exam period. "Look for improvements within

yourself rather than comparing yourself with others. Focus on your own journey and growth,

celebrating your personal successes and strengths," they said.

Students will receive their SACE results later in December, with SACE board chief executive Michaela Bensley wishing the best of luck for Year 12s across the state. "The SACE team has worked closely with schools throughout

the year to ensure a successful and positive examination experience,"

Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer said he appreciates that exams can be a stressful time.

"More than 12,500 South Australian students will undertake their exams over the next 10 days across 205 school sites," he said.

Prepare now for Fire Danger Season

SOUTH Australians are being urged to 'Be Bushfire Ready', with the annual campaign launching last week as the state heads into a predicted hotter and drier summer.

Adelaide Metropolitan is among three districts where the Fire Danger Season has been brought forward, with fire bans to begin on Friday, November 15.

The SA Country Fire Service (CFS) launched its Be Bushfire Ready campaign on Thursday, October 31, with a strong focus on simplifying the steps all South Australians need to take when preparing for the bushfire season.

"Whether you live, work, or travel through a bushfire risk area, it is critical that all South Australians are prepared for the upcoming Fire Danger Season and know what to do if a bushfire starts near them," CFS chief officer Brett Loughlin said.

for "Preparing the bushfire season is a shared responsibility - CFS staff and volunteers dedicate months of training to be ready to protect their communities and are urging everyone to do their bit by getting their properties and bushfire plans ready."

This season's heightened bushfire risk, as well as below-average fire activity in South Australia over the past few years, have prompted warnings against a rise in complacency after recent fire danger seasons.

Research conducted earlier this year shows more than half of residents who live in a bushfire risk area are aware they are under prepared for the bushfire season but do not appear to be addressing this, reinforcing the complacency in the community.

(MFS) chief officer Jeff the MFS Swann said encourages all South Australians to know their risk and prepare their homes and families ahead of this Fire Danger Season.

"Many South Australians living on the outskirts of Adelaide mistakenly believe they are not in a bushfire risk area, but these fires can have devastating effects in their communities," he said.

"During a bushfire, embers can travel kilometres ahead of the fire and can cause most houses to catch fire when sparks or burning embers settle on or around your home.

"It is essential for residents living on the outskirts of Adelaide, Adelaide Hills and larger country towns to

plan and prepare for what they will do when a bad fire day approaches - including where they will go, when they will leave and what they will take."

Minister for Emergency Services Dan Cregan said the Be Bushfire Ready campaign is about cutting through the complacency that threatens lives and properties.

"With dates brought forward in metropolitan areas and large parts of our regions, South Australians must prepare now to ensure they have a plan in place," he said. "Conditions are

particularly concerning and steps taken will help avoid further devastation in communities still recovering from past events."



Veterans aim to inspire through epic journey

A TRIO of veterans are beginning preparations for a journey around the country, filming a documentary while taking on the massive 15,000-kilometre trek on small postie bikes.

Stephen Lockwood and Michael Djoric, both from Freeling, will be joined by Jack Rainy, from Canberra, travelling around Australia meeting with veterans, highlighting their stories and successes and raising awareness for veterans' mental health.

The trio all met in Afghanistan and while they have all ventured down different paths since leaving the military, they still share a strong bond.

Mr Lockwood said the idea for 'The Last Post' documentary stemmed from seeing veterans, including close friends, struggle with life post-military.

"A lot of guys tend to hold onto that military mindset because they may believe that may be all they were at some point," he said.

"And then once they leave a lot of guys have a lot of issues trying to find their own identity again, especially if they join at quite a young age." Mr Lockwood just wanted to highlight some success stories to help inspire other veterans navigating life after military.

"I'm trying to highlight different stories across Australia and speak to these people and ask them what their measurement of success is," he said.

"I want to make sure they know that it's not the cliché answer that everyone tries to give, so they can be authentic and honest.

"And I thought we may as well try and do it while doing something difficult as well."

That is where the idea of making the trip on postie bikes came from, an iconic Australian vehicle.

"I just found that we should do it on postie bikes because it's difficult and because it's going to be slow... even though we might annoy truck drivers and for that we do apologise ahead of time," Mr Lockwood said.

It is still early days, with the trip expected to begin around October next year, but the response has already been strong.

'The Last Post' Facebook page has already amassed more than 1000 followers, and people have been reaching out from right across the country to be involved in the project.

"Every single person that we talk to about this... has been in immediately," Mr Lockwood said.

"That's how I know it's going to be a good idea, so I'm humbled by it, it seems to be growing at a phenomenal rate but I need to keep this momentum up because it's 12 months away."

Mr Lockwood has been working in the film industry for the past 12 months and spent many hours learning how to film as he prepares for the trip, with an editor and a camera operator also coming on board.

The project has partnered with Young Veterans, which assists veterans to succeed in life after service, and Andrew Russell Veteran Living, which offers affordable housing and provides practical supports to veterans in need.

The goal is to continue conducting as much community engagement as possible and encourage more sponsors to come on board for the project.

"The primary focus of our project will be to highlight the focus of the three of us coming together over something we all love to do, sharing our successes and sharing our failures... just filming us making this journey," he said.

"It's going to be difficult, it's going to be hot, it's going to be wild."

Council responds to survey feedback

LIGHT Regional Council has announced steps being undertaken to improve its service following the recent Community Satisfaction Survey.

The survey, which ran earlier this year, received almost 600 responses from the community, with the main issues being raised including the poor quality of roads and the responsiveness of council when contacted by ratepayers.

Council released a response last month, highlighting some of the key actions it will be taking, including improving road quality and enhancing communication.

Council will also implement a new Customer Relationship Management (CRM) system in 2025-2026, which aims to improve customer service and increase efficiency.

"Ideally, council's aim is to implement a CRM system that will automate some of the contact and engagement that the community has with council and will keep our community informed of any actions that are arising," Light Regional Council chief executive Richard Dodson said.

"At the moment, that is not automated and relies on manual systems which are susceptible to human error.

"Our community expect a modern communication system and platform to now be used when engaging with council."

Mr Dodson said ratepayers should see some of these changes come into effect quickly.

"While some of these actions will be implemented over a longer period, the community can expect to see an immediate change to the way in which it engages with council and council engages with it," he said.

Mayor Glenn Docherty said the charity provides the community with an opportunity to make a difference.


"For over a decade, our community has embraced GTGOR, whether through generous book donations or by connecting with others at handover celebrations in Playford's libraries," he said.

ALMOST 15 years ago, Gawler's Mark Payne suffered a stroke that changed his life dramatically.

A few years later, Mr Payne also had to undergo surgery that left him with the news that he would never walk again.

Now, he is well-known at Gawler's STARplex Centre for his almost daily workouts and intense boxing sessions.

Mr Payne has also spent his time after the incident working hard to get his body and mind sharp again, and has become an inspiration for the community.

Speaking with The Bunyip after his morning boxing session earlier this week, Mr Payne said he wants to share an important message to those who look to walk in his footsteps.

"Living with a disability doesn't mean you have to give up, it doesn't mean you don't get to live your life," he said.

When Mr Payne was told by doctors he would never be able to use his legs again, he instead defied all odds to begin the long journey of being able to walk again.

"Getting the news was devastating, it was life changing, but it was a start of a new journey for me," he said.

"I had to learn how to walk again, I had to learn how to live in a world that is designed for able-bodied people.

"Everything from using your phone, having a shower, getting through doors with a mobility scooter or wheelchair, people take all of these things for granted.

"Sometimes you don't plan for these things, life is a journey and it just happens, and you need to work through it and move on."

Around 10 years ago, Mr Payne was approached by a staff member at STARplex who wanted him to try boxing.

Ever since then, he has fallen in love with the sport and said he has worked hard to continue his passion, even without use of his right arm.

"I've put in the work, I was told I'd live life like I used to, it took me two months of hard work just to move one of my toes again after my surgery," he said.

"Now I'm working out in the gym and boxing almost every day.

"I find a lot of power in boxing, both physically and mentally.

"Even with exercising, it gets you out of the house, gets your body moving, but it also makes your mind sharp and you can release a lot of things in your head when you exercise."

Mr Payne also has no plans on giving up, and hopes to continue his visits to the gym for years to come.

"When I get older I want to keep exercising too, just because you're older doesn't mean you can't do the same things you were doing," he said. "It keeps your body and mind strong."

Having now become quite the regular in Gawler, Mr Payne said he hopes he can not only inspire others, but to share his insights on finding happiness.

"Some advice that I live by and that I hope to share with the community, is a motto which has gotten me through a lot," he said.

"When you're at the grocery store and there's something on the shelf you want to pick up but don't think you can reach it, try first before you ask for help, you might surprise yourself, or you might have to ask for help, and that's ok.

"I like biking when I'm in the gym, but I can't get my feet strapped onto the petals myself. I ask for help, and I don't let that stop me from riding.

"I have had so many people in my life that have supported me and made me the person I am today.

"There's too many to count, but my wife has stuck with me through it all, and she's kept me strong."

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
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New supports introduced for women escaping violence

THE STATE Government is introducing a number of innovations to provide new supports for South Australian women escaping violence.

Roundtables focused on easing the financial burden of domestic, family and sexual violence (DFSV) on South Australian women have led to action from the financial services and real estate sectors, including specialised training for staff to work with customers experiencing DFSV and making it simpler for survivors to open new and private bank accounts.

More than 70 participants from the financial services, real estate and DFSV sectors attended the roundtables held late last year to explore options to ensure women impacted by DFSV do not

bear the brunt of unpaid mortgages, loans, and rent. Minister for Women and

the Prevention of Domestic, Family and Sexual Violence Katrina Hildyard said every individual and organisation can play a part in helping to prevent DFSV and to support survivors.

"We know that financial economic abuse and insecurity are often part of a woman's experience of DFSV," she said.

"I am so pleased that a number of finance and real estate institutions are strengthening their awareness of this and playing a strong role in tackling this awful scourge.

"I am really grateful for the way in which the industry engaged in the roundtables and for the actions and strengthened collective understanding of the issues faced by women that have resulted from them."

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SUMMER PERILS FOR **DOGS AND CATS**

Summer brings a range of environmental hazards for pets. Pet owners need to anticipate the common summer perils and adopt preventive measures to keep dogs and cats safe during warmer months.

Heatstroke and Heat Exhaustion: this can be rapidly fatal for dogs with compromised respiratory function and older animals. It does not need to be extremely hot for the danger to be real. Be aware that dogs cannot cool their bodies by sweating and rely on panting to cool down.

• Risk: High temperatures, high humidity, lack of ventilation, or intense exercise can lead to overheating.

• Signs: Panting, drooling, bright red gums, lethargy, vomiting, collapse, seizures. Sudden death can occur with very little warning of a problem

• Prevention: Avoid walking pets during peak heat hours (typically midday to early afternoon). Always provide shade and fresh water. Never leave pets in parked cars, even with windows open. Use cooling vests or wet towels for pets prone to overheating.

• Treatment: Move to a cool area, offer water, apply cool (not ice-cold) wet towels to the body, and seek veterinary care immediately.

• Dehydration: Older animals are more at risk for dehydration. They will dehydrate rapidly as they exercise in warm or hot conditions.

• Risk: High temperatures increase the risk of dehydration.

• Signs: Lethargy, sunken eyes, dry gums, loss of skin elasticity

 Prevention: Provide access to fresh water at all times, carry water during walks or outdoor activities, and consider a pet water fountain to encourage hydration indoors.

Bush Fire Danger: most people are aware of the need to have a plan to keep safe in the event of a bush fire in the summer months, particularly those who live in fire prone areas. What is often overlooked is the safety of our precious pets in the event of a fire.

• Risk: the fire season is well publicised every year to remind people of the need to get prepared. Have a plan to keep safe in the event of a fire. Keep your pets in mind when you develop your plan. Where will we keep them until the danger is over? Can we provide food and water for them? Do they need medication to keep them calm? Do they have any medical condition that needs daily or regular administration of essential medications?

• Prevention: prepare for the worst in plenty of time and act early when the danger is real. Your precious pets rely on your actions to keep them safe. They are helpless without your help.

Charitable group stitched up with big task

A CHARITABLE Gawler group is spreading warmth through its love of knitting and crochet, with members meeting weekly to connect and build a sense of community.

Knit4Charities South Australia - Gawler Branch's members meet at Café Nova every Friday to catch up and have a yarn while doing what they love in knitting and crochet.

The members touch a lot of lives in the community, with their creations - which include beanies, toys and blankets - given to sick children in hospital, palliative care and chemo patients, and to people in need during winter.

Judi Hirst started the group and said the connections between people were what she loved to see.

"For me, it's the connections with the people here in Gawler and the wider community by being able to share what we like to do as a passion in our knitting and our crochet," Ms Hirst said.

"Maybe someone else will feel loved and cared for, particularly when they're perhaps down in hospital and that sort of thing.

"Just watching the ladies, the connections some of them have made. Some of them have quite sad stories behind them, it has been amazing really."

The group is now jointly run by Diane Borgo and Lesley Winning, and Ms Borgo said there is no better feeling than seeing the impact the group's work has on the community.

"It gives me a warm fuzzy feeling inside that I can give something to someone less fortunate than myself," she said.

"I recently had reason to go to the emergency department with my husband, and when I walked in I could see all these little toys I'd been making lined up in the window ready to give out to kids.

"That really made me feel that was worth the effort and I've done something good for the community."

To add to their work, the knitters also recently agreed to create a stack of red and white beanies and toys to go all around South Australia as part of the 2025 Variety Bash.

Gawler's Larry Cavallaro, a 33-year Variety Bash veteran, approached the group and asked the members if they could knit more than 100 beanies and toys to his Bash crew's theme of "Where's Wally".

In previous years, Mr Cavallaro's mum, Maria Cavallaro, knitted the Where's Wally items for the Bash, with his team giving them out to schools and children

899 members and 42 junior members.



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

Training aims to boost cyber smarts in schools

SOUTH Australian educators are upskilling to prevent potential cyber security breaches as part of a State Government partnership with Fortinet.

Department for Education staff and teachers are accessing free training modules which highlight the importance of identifying cyber threats early.

The modules include the use of realworld scenarios such as phishing attempts and fraudulent emails, with education surrounding the importance of multifactor authentication.

According to Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer, more than 600 educators have accessed the training in its first two months, with the training potentially to be offered to students in 2025.

"We know that cyber criminals are constantly looking for opportunities and a lack of awareness can make people more likely to fall victim to this kind of crime," Mr Boyer said.

"With these threats on the increase, everyone needs to help reduce the risk of them succeeding.

"The department's partnership with Fortinet represents a first in Australia, where we are leading the way, by offering cyber security awareness training to educators.

"It will ensure there is a better understanding of cyber security and enable them to be part of creating a more secure digital learning environment for staff and students."



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

TWO-time Schluter Medal winner and dual premiership star for South Gawler Steve Burton will return to the Riverland Football League in 2025 to play for his junior club Barmera-Monash.

GAWLER Rangers went down 21-0 to Sturt in Division 1 baseball at West Beach Parks on Saturday, with two stars of the ABL dictating terms.

A huge eight-run fourth inning by Sturt finished the game as a contest, with Gawler not helping its cause, walking seven batters.

The final two runs of the game came at the top of the seventh, when McArdle hit a two-run dinger.

While the Rangers were non-competitive in Division 1 this week, the other senior grades had great contests, with Division 3 and Division 4 getting up against Sturt and the Division 2 team losing by one run.

This Saturday the Rangers play Glenelg at Karbeethan Reserve from 4pm and will need to get back on track immediately, or fall behind the pack in the fight for a top-six berth.

Veteran's cricket controversy sparks 'Spirit of the game' discussion

JUST for something different, the dilemma of transgender participants in women's sports events has surfaced yet again.

This time, it was at the Veterans Cricket Association Women's Over 40 National Cricket Championships, recently held in Adelaide from October 26-31.

Having previously expressed personal views concerning шу the matter, this was my first experience of the issue first-hand as a member of the umpire's panel officiating at the championships.

The competition was a series of 35-over one-day matches and T20 games, culminating with a final to decide the overall winner.

Regulations required that a batter retired on reaching 50 in the 35over matches and 35 in the T20s.

In the Championship Division 1 competition, the batting was dominated by the NSW batter Erica James, who, in six innings, scored 159 runs from 115 balls (strike rate of 138.26) at an average of 53, required to retire on three occasions.

These remarkable statistics included a duck in Erica's first innings.

However, it was Erica's scoring statistics that were of major concern and debate. Of the 159 runs. there were 25 fours and 2 sixes; 112 runs from boundary hits (70.4 per cent of her total runs).

The power displayed by this player was remarkable compared to all others in the competition.

Erica James is a transgender athlete, demonstrating strength and power that was unique in this particular Australian Championships.

Erica's participation in this competition, and others, has been reviewed and discussed at the

highest level in Veterans Cricket matters? As stated by Christopher 'Dix-

ie' Daw, president of the South

Australia.

Australian Veterans Cricket Association: "It is certainly a vexing matter, and I want to assure you that it has been discussed in full by both SAVCA and the VCA well prior to the tournament.

"Our committee debated it and it was raised at the board level at the VCA months ago. The fact of the matter is that Erica James has been approved by the NSW cricketing associations and has been playing women's cricket for years in NSW.

"The VCA and NSW women's chair are very aware of it and claim that there has been no concern expressed over the years in NSW. Therefore, it was agreed that she play in the championships."

Here in, I believe, lies the problem. Is the tail wagging the dog or vice-versa? Who is deciding concerning this particular, and similar,

Is this a case of the governing Veterans Cricket Australia administration acting as a toothless tiger, and deciding that Erica was eligible to play in these Australian Championships because she "has been approved by the NSW cricketing associations and has been playing women's cricket for years in NSW."

What, because the VCA is dealing with a large and powerful state organisation, they will go with the flow and not upset and ruffle the feathers of NSW? That's hardly the ethical and moral approach required about this issue.

Cricket is a wonderful and unique sport in every way. No other sport talks of the "spirit" of the game.

The preamble as written leading into the Laws of Cricket is headed "The Spirit of Cricket".

As stated, "the major responsibility for ensuring fair play rests with the captains, but extends to all players and match officials/administrators...".

No other sport has coined a similar phrase into our language as "it's just not cricket", meaning "c'mon sport, this just isn't fair".

No one says "It's just not tennis" - or football, or hockey what a compliment to the sport of cricket and how it is played - or how it was played.

Any sporting contest is only fair if all contestants are of similar basic standards. With transgender athletes competing in female events, this is not so.

In this particular example Erica's superior strength, enabling her to dominate scoring, is a case of an uneven playing field and as such contradicts the 'Spirit of Cricket' and is succinctly summed up by saying; "that's just not cricket".

Sandy Creek and Tanunda big winners from A1 double-header

IT was a busy weekend in the Barossa and Light Cricket Association as the top three senior grades played a pair of one-day fixtures on Saturday and Sunday, and it was a pair of dominant victories from Sandy Creek that highlighted the A1 action.

Kicking things off on Saturday with an away trip to Kapunda, Sandy Creek both allowed the highest team total of the weekend and completed the largest chase, securing an eight-wicket triumph.

Strong performances with the bat from Joey Brown (82 runs from 92 balls), Elijah Murch (44 not-out from 29 deliveries), Jack Ryan (28 from 20) and Tom Harslett (20 from 22) had Kapunda reach the end of the 40 overs in a commanding position of 7/213.

But that total proved light work for the Cockatoos, who lost only two wickets on the way as openers Zac Kreutner (80 not-out from 103 balls) and Will O'Brien (25 from 35) set things up for captain and number three Rhys Handkte (76 from 60) to power through the finish line with four overs to spare.

Cockatoos take battle of the birds

With less than 24 hours to recover from their decisive Saturday win, the Cockatoos' bowlers rose to the occasion in Sunday's away fixture at Mallala, dismissing the Magpies for a dismal score of 92 from 33 overs.

Mallala number three Cameron Curnow (36 from 61 balls) did his best to keep the 'Pies afloat, but a string of three quick ducks from batters five-through-seven torpedoed the home side's innings.

Two of those ducks came from the bowling of Riley Greenlees (3/23 from eight overs), and after a handy contribution with the bat in the first game of the weekend, Cockatoo captain Handtke showed off his all-rounder ability by taking 3/14 from 7.2 overs.

Ryan Johnson (2/16 from five overs) and Ryan Stork (2/23 from six overs) also collected multiple wickets in the one-sided showing.

Chasing less than 100, Sandy Creek got the job done in the 16th over thanks to Kreutner (24 not-out from 43 balls), O'Brien (35 from 36) and Greenlees (23 not-out from 11).

The back-to-back wins improved the Cockatoos' record to 3-1. The only other team with three wins already is Kapunda, who bounced back from the Saturday loss against Sandy Creek to defeat Angaston by 26 runs on Sunday and retain a share of top spot.

Kapunda smothers Angaston batters

Batting first away from home at Angaston, Kapunda got off to a horror start, quickly losing both openers to fall to 2/2 after the first few overs.

Fortunately Tom Harslett (44 from 74 balls) at number three steadied the ship before getting himself run out, and the visitors were dragged into triple-figures by the late-innings partnership of Riley Menzel (35 from 45) and Elijah Murch (20 not-out from 42), turning 6/64 into 7/118.

Ultimately Kapunda put up a competitive total of 8/126 for Angaston to chase, and the home team never looked likely.

No other Angaston batters passed seven runs, while all six Kapunda bowlers secured at least one wicket each, including multiple from Harslett (2/4 from 3.3 overs), Joey Brown (2/13 from six overs), Dylan Bishop 2/18 from six overs) and Max McCarthy (2/24 from four overs).

The loss capped a disappointing weekend for Angaston, who also struggled to put up runs in a Saturday defeat against Mallala.

By splitting their two fixtures, Mallala now owns a 2-2 record through four rounds, while Angaston slipped to 1-3 following a pair of losses.

Centrals break their duck

The only other A1 team yet to record two wins is Gawler Central, although they secured their first in Saturday's seven-wicket result over local rivals South Gawler.

Playing at Gawler Central, it was the Lions who decided to bat first after winning the toss, and after six of their top-seven batters combined for just 40 runs it was the partnership of tail-ender David Golder (44 from 49 balls) and captain Brodie Barker (38 from 61) that salvaged a respectable score.

Gawler Central would have been eyeing a quick chase when they had South sitting at 6/56, but the 65-run partnership from Golder and Barker carried the away team to 9/161 from the full 40 overs, despite the bowling efforts of Mitchell Gammie (3/34 from eight overs) and Cameron Vardy (2/30 from eight overs).

South slip to 2-2

Having come into the weekend boasting a flawless 2-0 mark, South Gawler came crashing back down to earth with two losses in two days after falling 13 runs short against Tanunda on Sunday.

To Tanunda's credit, the Magpies put up what was easily Sunday's biggest score in the division with a 40-over total of 5/198 thanks to the work of Trent Goers (80 from 90 balls), Jonathan Justin (51 from 90) and Luke Snowden (38 from 33).

Raymond Smith (3/33 from eight overs) was the only Lion bowler to take multiple wickets.

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Reoffender produces memorable victory

STAR young trotter Reoffender gave his rivals a massive start and still proved too good in the Imperial Count USA @ Bellmoure Park 2024 Parker Classic (1800m) at Globe Derby Park.

A stunned owner-breeder Geoff Easom said "that was Minor Derby stuff" in reference to the champion pacer who often gave his rivals starts of up to 100 metres around the tiny Wayville track, but was good enough to grab victories.

Co-trainer Jill Neilson, who trains in partnership with Katie Wilson, believes Reoffender could be the best trotter she has trained while Wilson is an awe of the gelding's potential.

The Parker Classic is a standing start for two-year-olds and only over 1800 metres, a distance considered a sprint for trotters.

A winner of two of his three starts, and beaten a short half-head in his loss, Reoffender was a redhot \$1.45 favourite for the feature, and began slowly, but safely, for reinsman Wayne Hill from gate two.

However, heading into the first turn, Reoffender galloped, and it took Hill a short distance to get the gelding back into a trot - by which time the leader, Sunny Majesty (\$7), had gained a massive advantage.

"I had given up hope of a win," Easom said, while Neilson said she thought Hill would look after the trotter - but they had not allowed for the trotter's talent, and the driver's determination.

Reoffender took a lap to catch up to the body of the field, but going into the back straight Sunny Majesty and Feel The Moment (\$4.40), with a 30-second second quarter, had established a good break.

Sunny Majesty beat off Feel The Moment turning for home and driver David Smith was probably thinking he had the win, but Hill steered Reoffender into the sprint lane and quickly gathered in the leader to win by one-and-a-half metres.

The win was the culmination of an incredible day for Neilson.

She started things off by celebrating the 90th birthday of her mother Elma West, who herself had harness highlights with Cassius Court and Deep Court, champions of the 1960s.

In the afternoon, a fire near her Penfield stables and close to the Edinburgh Air Force Base threatened to wreak havoc, but 38 trucks, supported by water bombers, eased the tension allowing Neilson and later Wilson to take their horses to Globe Derby Park.

Heston Blue Streak (\$12) started the night off on a winning note, leading throughout for driver Danielle Hill, before Reoffender won to give the training partnership of Neilson and Wilson a double.

Neilson said Reoffender would now be readied for the Southern Cross series later in the month.

Dani Hill later brought up a double, winning on Delightful Major for trainer David Harding in the Globe Derby Life Members Pace (1800m) while Wayne Hill also landed a double, winning on La Moth for trainer Aaron Bain in the Kevin And Kay Seymour Pace (1800m).

For Wayne Hill, it was an early

wedding present as he will marry fellow trainer-driver Samantha Pascoe on Sunday.

Some long-price bets were landed when Night Spirit finished best in the Ladbrokes Bert Ticker Pace (2230m).

Trained by Reece Moore and driven by Gaita Pullicino, Night Spirit firmed late from \$41 into \$14.

The seven-year-old pushed through to lead from gate one, but Whata Optimist (\$9) was urged forward by Bernadette Page from gate three, and after a short tussle, assumed control.

On the home turn, Pullicino eased Night Spirit off the inside and the gelding sprinted strongly to catch

Whata Optimist and win by nearly five metres.

Moore missed the win as he had gone back to his Penfield stables to pick up other runners for later in the night and returned to learn of the result five minutes after the race.

The trainer said he had relocated from Merbein in Victoria and now had nine horses in work at the stables originally used by the champion trainer Lance Justice.

"I am also working six days a week for trainer Ryan Hryhorec, so I have busy days," Moore said.

"If you want to have success you have to put in the hours. I am looking to build a successful stable here in South Australia."

Nuri's Norton knocks 102 not-out

JUST like the A1s, the Barossa and Light Cricket Association's A2 and A3 senior divisions also played double-headers on Saturday and Sunday, and it was Nuriootpa's Mitch Norton who made the most of it with an unbeaten century to close the weekend.

Nuri kicked things off on Saturday away from home at Sandy Creek, going down by 45 runs after failing to chase down the Cockatoos' strong 40-over total of 190.

Corey Roberts (49 runs from 79 balls) led the five Cockatoos to score at least 20 runs each, while Garry Swyguizen (5/37 from eight overs) had plenty of success for Nuriootpa with the ball.

Wickets fell early and often during the chase, with Corey Smith (43 not-out from 79 deliveries) and Tom Giles (23 from 22) providing the only real resistance before being bowled out in the 35th over.

But Nuriootpa brushed off that result and came back on Sunday ready to turn the page, this time batting first at home against Gilbert Valley and posting an impressive score of 5/240.

Norton – who did not play in Saturday's loss – was the catalyst, coming in at number four with his side flailing at 2/8 and he survived all the way until the end, piling up 102 not-out from 107 balls.

He hit 13 boundaries (two sixes) while the rest of his team combined for 14, with handy contributions from Kyle Butler (58 from 57 balls) and Aaron Wilson (37 not-out from 23).

While Norton enjoyed the best individual performance from the busy weekend, the standout team was fellow A2 outfit Eudunda Robertstown, who claimed top spot on the ladder after a pair of decisive victories.

NORTHERN Districts' Aubrey Stockdale put together an early contender for SACA Premier Cricket's best bowling performance of the season, taking 8/38 to give the Jets a chance at an outright victory in a two-day battle against the SACA U19s.

But when the teams arrived on Sunday morning for day two it became clear early on it would be all about Stockdale.

Stockdale took the only wicket on day one, boasting solid figures of 1/15 from five overs, but he caught fire upon the resumption of play and followed up with seven more wickets from his next 6.3 overs.

With a first-inning lead of 181 the Jets tried to quickly add on before declaring, but to SACA's credit they bowled much better the second time around, restricting Northern Districts to 8/91 before the declaration arrived after 22 overs.

It meant SACA had to either survive 51 overs, or score 273 to pull off a reverse-outright.

There was no interest from the visitors in blocking out a first-innings loss as Kane Halfpenny (40 from 58 balls), Haard Shah (34 from 54) and Hayden Schiller (29 not-out from 37) helped the U19s reach 9/200, with time running out before the Jets could secure the 20th wicket.

It was a quieter showing from Stockdale (0/45 from 13 overs) in the second innings. Instead, it was Brandon Bray (3/46 from 13 overs), Walter Kinlock (2/25 from seven overs) and Gareth Cox (1/7 from three overs) picking up the slack.

Northern Districts' top side will next face Prospect in the two-day clash across the next two Saturdays.

Women's

It was an outing to forget for the Jets' senior women, who suffered an eight-wicket defeat at the hands of Glenelg after being held to a disappointing total of 103.



Kapunda was a top-three side last time around, and the Tanunda win came a week after the Magpies also knocked off reigning premiers Angaston, signalling a massive improvement.



Three-time Bradman Medallist heads to Gawler

RECENTLY former Sheffield Shield cricketer Rob O'Shannassy was a guest speaker at Joslin for Sporting Memories, and next Thursday will talk to the Gawler group.

O'Shannassy played four Sheffield Shield games for South Australia in the 1976-77 season, with his best batting and bowling figures coming in the same game, against Queensland on Adelaide Oval, scoring 48 with the bat and taking 2/54 with the ball.

There seems to be something about achieving with the bat and ball in the same game for Rob, because, while at Adelaide Boys High School in 1966, he not only hit his only century (against CBC), he took a hat-trick – the only one he has ever taken in a game.

At District Cricket level, O'Shannassy played with three www.bunyippress.com.au clubs – Prospect, University and Tea Tree Gully – over a 21year period from 1966, and won the Bradman Medal as the Best District Cricketer three times, in 1969, 1980 and 1981.

Over his District cricket career, O'Shannassy scored 4278 runs at an 18.43 average, and, amazingly, had a similar 18.34 average from his 521-wicket haul as a bowler.

While O'Shannassy has fond memories of his meetings with Don Bradman, he also was lucky enough to play with one of South Australia's top sportsmen, Barrie Robran, as a teammate at North Adelaide Football Club, where he played 16 league games in the early 1970s.

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Sweet justice

HILE there's no shortage of legal dramas to show us what goes on inside a courtroom, very little is known about real-life jury trials – and that's by design. Twelve strangers, brought together by random selection, decide the fate of the accused, but are forbidden from discussing the case – until now.

This groundbreaking new series re-enacts a real manslaughter trial word-for-word over five episodes, empanelling 12 everyday Australians from all walks of life to interpret evidence, confront their own biases and decode legal arguments in the privacy of the jury room. Staged in a former courthouse in Sydney, the trial runs for eight days.

It's a rare insight into the process itself, but also the participants' personalities and prejudices. With a former prison officer, retired hospital clerk, funeral attendant and sex worker among them, there's sure to be some differences of opinion when it comes to the justice system.

In tonight's premiere, we meet the jurors, before the group selects a foreperson, and the trial begins. Will they work together and arrive at a decision? And will






